The two-story, rusticated pressed or artificial stone facade, transitional Queen Anne Style building located at #308 Cocoanut Avenue, was built from 1909 to mid-January of 1910 for Dr. & Mrs. Joseph Halton. Evaluation of documented construction techniques points to the use of the "Miracle Pressed Stone Company's" molds in the construction of #308 Cocoanut Avenue, a mold which was patented in 1903 and used to form the blocks used in the gonstruction of "the Acacias", the home of Mrs. Benjamin Honore In addition to the use of the "Miracle" mold which Mr. Maus (recently demolished). owned and used in Sarasota, further substantiation to the attribution of Mr. Joseph Maus as designer and builder of #308 Cocoanut Avenue is provided by two postcard views of #308 Cocoanut Avenue, owned by the family of Mr. Maus. Visual documentation of the original appearance of the Halton Residence is also provided by the early Maus postcards. The two-story structure originally had a prominent one-story asymetrical open porch located at the south elevation, and wrapping around to the entrance at the west elevation. A second visible open polygonal porch appeared at the second-story of a polygonal projecting bay located at the south elevation. Both porches were characterized by the use of a laurel wreath frieze, cast Tuscan columns, set on high pedestals and pressed stone balustraded railings. At an early date, the south-west and second-story polygonal porches were enclosed -- the alterations involved the reuse of the balustraded railing at the second floor of the south-west elevation. Sub sequent alterations (post 1977) have involved the unsympathetic enclosure of the west entrance porch; however, this alteration is reversible.

TEXT SUPPORTING SUMMARY OF PRESENT AND ORIGINAL PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The two-story, pressed stone, transitional Queen Anne Style building located at 308 Cocoanut Avenue (north-east corner of Third Street), was built from 1909 to 1910 for Dr. & Mrs.. Joseph Halton. A contemporary press clipping noted: "Dr. & Mrs. Joseph Halton are moving into their new stone mansion today." Evaluation of construction techniques provides evidence that the Halton residence was built by Joseph S. Maus, -who was originally from Northumberland, Pennsylvania, but was engaged in the concrete and construction business in Sarasota." Further evidence exists which establishes the source of the machine used to mold the pressed-stone blocks and ornamentation present in the structure -- the Miracle Pressed Stone Company of Minneapolis, Minnesota, patented a double-staggered, air space cement building block in 1903. J.S. Maus and Son were responsible for the pressed blocks and construction of "The Acacias", in and the Miracle Pressed Stone Company's molds were used to create the pressed Two postcard views of #308 Cocoanut Avenue, circa 1910, owned by the family stone. of Mr. J.S. Maus, provide pot only a basis for attribution, but visual documentation of the original structure.

The description which follows is divided into three periods: the original appearance of the Halton Residence, (circa 1910); alterations effecting the structure (pre-1920); and finally, recent alterations (post 1977).

<u>1909-1910</u>: The pressed stone or cement block two-story structure with one-story asymetrical porch, projecting from the west or entrance elevation, wrapping around the south elevation and terminating at the intersection of the south elevation projecting round bay with open polygonal porch above; was sited in the middle of Lots 2, 4, 6 of STATE OF FLORIDA DEPARTMENT OF STATE Division of Archives, History and Records Management OS-HSP-3E MRNS #3

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Block 21.¹² The foundation and water table courses were of smooth-faced blocks; while the second-floor facades, chimneys, column bases and pedestals were molded with a rusticated face. The projecting semi-circular/polygonal wing located at the south elevation. was a pressed stone "tour-de-force", constructed of segmentally-shaped blocks, used to create an apsidal plan. The window lintels and sills projected slightly from the building plane and were cast in one large mold with rusticated facing. There were two visible chimneys, both rectangular in plan, one located at the north-west elevation, one visible at the east elevation. The main roof was hipped with bracketed overhang, the porch roof a modified hip, while the roof of the semi-circular wing was polygonal (reflecting the polygonal plan of the second-story open porch). All roof surfaces appeared to be shingle clad. Fenestation was symetrical -- windows were wood, double-hung-sash in a one-over-one configuration. Both visible porches were similar in the use of a laurel wreath, cast Tuscan columns, supported on high pedestals (three courses of rusticated blocks); and the use of cast or pressed stone balustraded railings which appeared between each columnar division. Original windows were one-over-one double-hung wooden sashed openings.

Alterations (pre-1920): At an undetermined date the Halton Residence was enlarged. The use of rusticated pressed stone in the alteration of the south-west elevation of the building; as well as an evaluation of the construction techniques practised in Sarasota prior to 1920, lean toward a pre-1920 date. A comparison of the two postcard views of the west and south elevations of #308 Cocoanut Avenue, indicated the following changes were made: A two-story masonry addition was added at the south-west elevation, the ground-floor open porch was enclosed but the new facade was also constructed of rusticated pressed stone which was set on a smooth, continuous, high water table. A segmentally-arched, triple window with lead-camed transsome, pressed stone voussoirs and rusticated sill was provided at the ground floor level of the enclosed porch. At the second-story, a flat-roofed, rectangular addition intersected the original hipped roof--three, paired, trabeated window openings pierced the south and south-west facades. An early re-use of materials was evident -- the balustraded railing formerly located at the ground-floor open porch was. incorporated at the sill-level of the second-story windows at the south-west elevation. The open porch located at the second-floor of the polygonal bay, was enclosed -- wood covered with a parget coat was inserted behind the open balustraded railing and multi-paned windows replaced the columned, open porch bays. Windows of this early alteration were six and eight-paned wood casement.

At a later date a two-story shed-roofed addition at the north elevation, intersecting the original structure at the eastern bay was built. At the east elevation an original artificial stone exterior chimney was blocked and converted to an exterior elevator shaft (date unknown).

<u>Alterations 1977 - 1983</u>: Based on photographic documentation of 1977 (FMSF#80S297) the one-story entrance porch located at the west elevation was recently enclosed. The hipped roof of the entrance porch has received a new composition surface, and a new quarrel-patterned door with awkward side-lights has been provided. New fixed glass windows flank the new door. These alterations are reversible. The original facade color was a grey tint in imitation of rusticated granite. It has been paint-ed a pale butterscotch color.

The site context of the structure is important. The detached structure is located in an area of creeping commercialism. The property is zoned "RMF5".

SUMMARY OF STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Number 308 Cocoanut Avenue is representative of the second period of the development of the architecture of Sarasota. Built beginning in 1909 and completely by January the residence of the Dr. Joseph Halton family was one of the early pressed of 1910, or artificial stone buildings attributed to the local craftsman, Joseph S. Maus. The Halton residence pre-dates "the Acacias", also built by Mr. Maus who used various molds produced by the Miracle Pressed Stone Company of Minneapolis for the construc-tion of both buildings. The quality of construction technique and the integration of pressed stone elements in the overall design scheme of 308 Cocoanut Avenue are noteworthy. Examples of Mr. Maus' craftsmanship should be documented and preserved. Number 308 Cocoanut Avenue was the residence of the prominent local doctor, Joseph Halton, who was born in England, arrived in Sarasota in 1907, served as Agent for, the State Board of Health of Florida and practiced medicine until his death in 1963. Tn addition to his prominent medical career, Dr. Halton was president of the Town Counc ° and was awarded the "Citizen of the Year" award by the American Legion of Sarasota in 1951.

SUMMARY OF STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The two-story artificial stone building located at 308 Cocoanut Avenue and the corner of Third Street, was built for the family of Dr. Joseph Halton from 1909 and completed by January 1913. Evaluation of construction techniques provides the basis of attribution of Joseph S. Maus as the builder at #308 Cocoanut. Mr. Maus, who was engaged in the concrete and construction business in Sarasota until his death in 1913, was responsible for the design and construction of "the Acacias" the home of the B.L. Honore's, which was described in a Times article as follows:

"Mention should have been made of J.S. Maus who had designed the house ["the Acacias"] and whose skillful workmanship has made it one of the best planned and executed buildings in the state."²²

Mr. Maus used molds produced by the Miracle Pressed Stone Company of Minneapolis, Minnesota for the construction of artificial stone used at the Acacias. Further documentation exists in the form of a post card collection owned by the family of J.S. Maus-two post card views of #308 Cocoanut Avenue provide not only a basis for attribution, but an early view of the original structure. Number 308 Cocoanut Avenue, the Dr. Joseph Halton residence; 1646 Morrill Street, the J.D. Hazen Residence; and, 1367-1369 Main Street, the Iwersen Block are among the extant and significant buildings attributed to J.S. Maus. They are significant in construction technique, the understanding of the material and the successful design integration of individual pressed or artificial s elements. 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Dr. Joseph Halton was born "at St. Helens, Lancashire, England, settling with his family in Bowling Green, Ohio at the age of seven. He graduated from Miami Medical College of Oxford, Ohio and the University of Cincinnati."²⁴ Dr. Halton arrived in Sarasota in 1907 and joined his brother, Dr. Jack Halton, in practice at the Halton Sanatorium. At a later date Dr. Joseph Halton_established a private hospital in the Halton Building at 113 North Pineapple Avenue. Dr. Halton served as health agent for the then Manatee County; he was appointed by the State Board of Health of Florida and he practiced medicine until his death in 1963. In addition to his prominent medical career, Dr. Halton served as a member of the Town Council and was president of the Council, elected in the year 1910. In 1951 the American Legion presented the "Citizen of the Year" citation to Dr. Halton, in recognition for the over 1,600 free operation performed and medical care provided for needy children, his civic endeavors, and "Third: the community is a better place because he has worked and lived with us."
