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The <u>State Capital</u> hit the dusty streets of Guthrie at four o'clock in the afternoon of April 22, 1889 -- the day of the "run" -- having been printed in a hastily erected tent on a corner lot at Cleveland and Broad streets. The new daily moved into a just as hastily erected frame building six days later. In 1890 it moved into two rented rooms of a new, more substantial brick building at the southwest corner of Harrison Avenue and Second Street (the site under consideration in this nomination). For reasons mentioned in No. 8 the <u>State Capital</u> operation continued to grow and another first floor room was rented in 1893. In 1897 the newspaper bought the building -- four stories, counting the basement. And in 1900, when the McKennon Opera House, which occupied the top floor, moved into a new home of its own, the <u>State Capital</u> expanded into the additional space, for the first time utilizing the entire building. Its press capacity was a respectable 25,000 papers per hour. Its machinery was powered by its own generating plant, run by two gas engines.

Then on Easter Sunday, March 30, 1902, the building burned to the ground. According to the cornerstone on the present building, the paper missed no issues. By April 16 it was re-established in another building, temporarily, while the burned site was cleared and a new, more elaborate plant was built. Designed by Jos. Foucart, an early day Oklahoma architect who made the "Run" and was the principal designer of many of the first structures in the new territory, the \$75,000 building was ready for use that fall. It was 50 x 140 feet, with three stories above a fullsize basement. "Some people tell me," says the present owner, "that at the time it was built it was described as the biggest printing plant west of the Mississippi . . ." Certainly it must have been one of the best equipped. With the memory of the destructive fire fresh on his mind, Editor Greer insisted on a fire-proof vault on each of the four working floors. In an age when other than natural air-conditioning was unknown, fourteen-foot ceilings on the three upper floors ensured a measure of comfort on even the hottest days.

The business office was unusually handsome, in some ways more reminiscent of a bank than a newspaper office. Window cages, combining metal and elegantly finished oak, bore the legends "Cashier," "Subscriptions," and "Classified." Ceilings were of zinc sheets, highly ornamented, in the commercial style so popular at the time. One entire wall of the office was made of filing drawers, finished with quarter-sawed oak. They held the standardized city, county, and state printing forms that constituted a good part of the commercial business of the <u>State Capital</u> and then of the Cooperative Publishing Company.

Although now operating on a greatly reduced scale, the plant is still open. The <u>State Capital</u> press itself was removed at the time the paper ceased publication in 1911. But its linotypes are still in place, along with most of its other job-press equipment - four hand-fed Miehle cylinder presses, two Chandler and Price platten presses, two Kluge platten presses, rare ruling machines, four guillotine paper cutters (including at least one that survived the 1902 fire), and much other equipment, most of it old, some of it now quite rare.

In this age of "instant" everything it is interesting to remember that present-day Oklahoma had "instant" cities almost a century ago grassy patches of uninhabited prairie that within hours of the "run" of April 22, 1889, were indeed tent "cities" of thousands of settlers. Oklahoma City was one such city to spring up Phoenix-like between noon and sunset. Guthrie, some 30 miles to the north, was another. And the instant city of Guthrie -- capital of Oklahoma Territory and the State of Oklahoma until 1910 -- can also boast an instant daily newspaper, the Daily State Capital, which hit the dusty would-be streets of the city at four o'clock on the afternoon of the Run. It was the first daily paper ever published in what is now Oklahoma and, although it ceased publication March 28, 1911, its physical plant has continued to operate down to the present -- for almost 50 years as the Co-operative Publishing Company, one of the state's largest publishing houses, and then as a more modest job printing plant.

The State Capital began as a weekly paper, printed in Winfield, Kansas. It was founded by Frank H. Greer on March 30, 1889 - three weeks before the opening of Oklahoma Territory to settlement. Initial press run was 15,000 copies. The first edition (now a collector's item) contained the proclamation of President Harrison, opening the territory to white settlement, information for homeseekers on regulations pertaining to the claiming of homestead land, and a picture of the traditional eagle with a ribbon in its beak bearing the legend: "I Scream For Oklahoma." Greer printed two more editions of the weekly in Kansas (April 13 and April 20) before throwing his press and other equipment on a train and heading for Guthrie the day of the run. From a hastily erected tent on a lot at the corner of Cleveland and Broad Streets the first Oklahoma edition of the new daily appeared. The enterprise that went into its founding carried over into its daily operation and assured its success ... so long as Editor Greer's Republican party was in control of Territorial government. With a Republican administration in Washington, the appointive Territorial governor was Republican, as were most of the state officals. The State Capital Printing Company was awarded all the Territorial printing and it soon became the territory's largest job printing, book binding, and school supply business.

Co-operative Printing Co. Building

From its tent the infant daily had moved to a frame building within a week. By 1890 it had moved again, this time to two rooms of a large brick building on the location of the present Co-operative Publishing Company building. By 1897 the newspaper/publishing company occupied the entire 3-story building, giving it a total of 10,000 square feet of floor space. It was soon employing up to one hundred people, and running 24 hours a day, six days a week, to keep up with the demand for its admittedly top quality services. Even an Easter morning fire, March 30, 1902, that burned its building to the ground, only inconvenienced the State Capital temporarily. Subscription money poured in. That fall a new building costing \$75,000 was completed on the same site. The Daily State Capital itself had not missed an issue.

Politics, however, proved far more disruptive. With statehood in 1907, and the elction of state officials, Charles Haskell, a Democrat, became Oklahoma's first State Governor. A feud promptly developed between Governor Haskell and staunchly Republican Editor Greer. The <u>State Capital</u> was highly critical of the Haskell administration and there is reason to believe that this ill will was a contributing factor -- with the boosterism zeal of Oklahoma City business leaders -- to the removal to that city from Guthrie of the state capital in 1910. Frank Greer sold out to the rival Democratic daily, the Leader (established in 1891 and still being published), and the State Capital suspended operation on March 28, 1911.

The printing and binding operation of the sizeable plant were continued under the name of Co-operative Publishing Company, for many years the state's largest publishing house. It is still operating as a small job printer. However, most of the original (post 1902) equipment is still in the building. It is this unique combination of elaborate physical plant, museum-like collection of vintage equipment, and strong historical significance that Guthrie interests and the Oklahoma Press Association hope to convert into a Museum of Newspapers and Printing that will serve as a meaningful monument to the printing trade, particularly as it grew and played its important role in the development of the frontier, first as Territory and then as the Union's 46th State.

Summary Paragraph

The Co-operative Publishing Company Building is located at the southwest corner of the intersection of West Harrison and Second Street in downtown Guthrie, Oklahoma. Constructed in 1902, the commercial style building reflects the originality of architect Joseph Pierre Foucart. The three-story building is located at the edge of the Guthrie National Historic Landmark District.

The Co-operative Publishing Company Building was originally listed in the National Register of Historic Places on May 18, 1972 at the local level under Criteria A for Commerce and Politics. The purpose of this additional documentation is to amend the nomination for the following reasons:

- 1) Provide a complete and orderly architectural description
- 2) Adding additional information for Criteria C to address the local architectural significance of the property

Narrative Description

The Co-operative Publishing Company Building has a canted entry at the northeast corner. Three sets of steps lead to the entry landing at the main corner entry. Each floor of the canted entry has a balcony over-hang that is supported by fluted stone columns with Doric capitals. The first floor over-hang/second floor balcony is brick faced with a stone cornice and metal railings. The face of the balcony has individual letters that spell "THE STATE CAPITAL." The second floor over-hang/third floor balcony is brick faced with a stone cornice and metal railings. The face of the balcony has individual letters that spell "ESTABLISHED 1889." The third floor over-hang actually continues to a tower over the canted entry. The face of the third floor has a plaque which reads "THE STATE CAPITAL CO. 1902." Above the sign is an open air, Onion dome tower with engaged turrets and a dentilated frieze detail. The first floor entry has a rusticated masonry surround with two pane and panel wood doors and an arched transom with a stone sill. The second and third floor entries that lead to the balconies are identical: each has a pane and panel wood door with a glass transom and flat stone lintel.

The east elevation is divided into three bays. Each bay is accentuated by engaged brick columns. The three engaged columns at the south end of the façade are capped with stone turrets. The basement level is visible on this elevation. The basement is clad in rusticated masonry and has a finished stone watertable. From north to south at the basement level are: four two-over-two windows, two pane and panel wood doors, and a one-over-one window. A metal awning with chains covers the basement entry doors. The first floor has two large wood frame display windows in the north and middle bays. The south bay has a curved blind window with a brick surround and a wood one-over-one hung window with a wood transom, stone sill and flat stone lintel. The second floor has two one-over-one hung wood windows with wood transoms in each bay. Each window has a stone sill. Both windows, in each bay, have a continuous stone drip cap. The third floor has two one-over-one hung wood windows with wood transoms in each bay. Each window has a stone sill and an individual stone drip cap. The parapet is ornamental brick with dentils. The top portion of the parapet advertises "THE STATE CAPITAL COMPANY."

The south elevation has a one-story wing at the southwest corner. This one-story wing has a wood pane and panel door on the east elevation that is accessed via a set of steps. The entry has a three course brick header lintel. The south elevation has, from east to west, two one-over-one wood hung windows, a pane and panel wood entry door, and three one-over-one wood hung windows. Each has a stone sill and brick arched lintel. This elevation is accessed via an ADA ramp concealed by modern brick knee walls. The west elevation of the one-story wing has a wood panel door. The basement level of the south elevation is visible east of the one-story wing. The basement has eight two-over-two wood windows. The watertable continues to this elevation. The first floor has four one-over-one hung wood windows with wood transoms. Each window has a stone sill and a three course brick header lintel. The second and third floors are identical on this elevation. Each has, from east to west, six one-over-one wood hung windows, a pane and panel wood door, three one-over-one wood hung windows, chimney, and three one-over-one wood hung windows. Each window has a stone sill and a three course brick header lintel. The second and third floors are identical on this elevation. Name of Property County and State doors also have a three course brick header lintel. Aligned with the doors on the second and third floors is a modern curved fire escape. The parapet on this elevation is stepped. The parapet also boasts a ghost sign that reads "COOPERATIVE PUBLISHING CO. GREAT PRINTING HOUSE OF OKLAHOMA."

The basement of the west elevation is exposed with rusticated masonry. The watertable extends along this elevation. There are five two-over-two windows at the basement level. The west elevation is defined by the same three distinctive bays at the east elevation. The first floor has two one-over-one wood hung windows with a wood transom, stone sill and curved brick lintels in each bay. The second floor has two one-over-one hung wood windows in each bay. Each window has a stone sill. Located between the north and middle bay on the second floor is a very small one-over-one hung wood window with a stone sill and brick lintel. The third floor has two one-over-one hung wood windows in each bay. Each window has a stone sill and a brick lintel. A chimney punctuates the roof in the north bay. Located in the parapet on this elevation is a ghost sign that reads "CO-OPERATIVE PUBLISHING CO."

The north elevation basement is visible and has nineteen wood windows. The basement wall is rusticated masonry and has the continuous watertable from the other elevations. The first floor, from east to west, has the following: two large wood frame display windows, two curved blind windows with a brick surround, two wood panel doors with a wood frame transom, a metal frame window unit with a central hung window flanked by narrow fixed pane windows and a three part transom window with dentil details separating the windows from the transom, a single one-over-one hung wood window with a large wood transom window. The second and third floors each read as nine bays wide based on the windows configuration. Each window is a one-over-one wood framed hung window. All of the windows on the second floor have stone sills and an inverted U-shaped stone drip cap. The third floor windows have stone sills and individual flat drip caps. The parapet has raised brick details including dentils. The parapet is punctuated with five turrets that rest on engaged brick columns. A metal platform is located at the northwest end of the building.

Interior:

The basement level retains the historic printing press and work stations of the publishing company. It also retains the large heating system. Slender metal columns run the length of the basement providing support for the entire building. The main floor (first floor) retains pressed metal ceilings, a cashier's space, a wall of metal storage/secure boxes/drawers and slender metal columns running the length of the building. The second floor, accessed via a grand wooden staircase in the center of the building, is divided into office suites with transom windows above the doors. The third floor is a large open space with a narrow staircase that provides access to the roof top deck.

The Co-operative Publishing Company Building was originally listed in the National Register of Historic Places in 1972 under Criteria A for Commerce and Politics. However, the property is also locally significant for its architecture at the local level.

Narrative Statement of Significance (Provide at least **one** paragraph for each area of significance.)

Updated Information:

In the preparation of the Co-operative Publishing Company Building National Register of Historic Places nomination in 1972, the architectural significance was not addressed. The information that follows will address the significance of the architecture within the local context.

The Co-operative Publishing Company Building was designed by Guthrie architect Joseph Foucart. Constructed in 1902, the Co-operative Publishing Company building is classified as a Commercial style building with exotic influences. Foucart was educated in Europe where the stylized buildings influenced his future designs. His buildings typically have load bearing walls, arched openings, and columnar details found in piers, engaged columns or pilasters. Foucart's designs were typically Gothic in influence.

The Co-operative Publishing Company Building is one of Foucart's more remarkable designs where he departed from his traditional style. The facades are very symmetrical with smooth wall surfaces with simple windows. Standard Commercial style influences can be seen in the use of the large banks of windows, multiple entry areas into both facades and the masonry construction. What is most unusual about this building however, is his use of the three dimensional tower and onion dome at the corner of the building and the use of the engaged turrets on both facades. In this building, Foucart exhibited his exotic architectural background on a Commercial style building. His other buildings in Guthrie, while stylistically important, are examples of the Richardsonian Romanesque and Gothic styles. Locally, this is the only extant example of the Commercial style with exotic revival influences designed by Joseph Foucart that draws attention to a corner entry with an onion dome and columnar accents.
