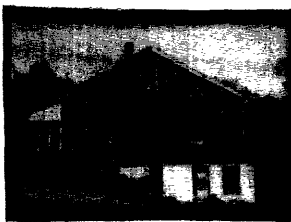

18. Description Two-story, five-bay double pile stone dwelling built onto the side of the hill. Like many of the other stone buildings in Camp Springs, this structure has a rear entrance onto the second floor. 18. Present occupant indicated the interior features a center passage with two rooms on each side of both floors. Ten foot ceilings downstairs and eleven feet upstairs.

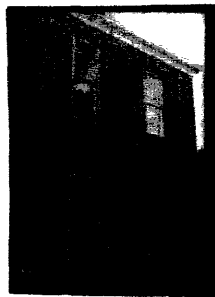
Also located on the immediate property is a bank barn, stone garage(altered), and brick and stone chickenhouse.

19. was in residence. It is very possible that this surname was misspelled, for a Frederich Leix [sic?], a forty year old farmer from Wurttemberg, Germany is listed in the 1880 census. It is known that members of the Spitzelberger family, including Father Spitzelberger, lived in the house. Edward Leick lived here until his death in 1947.

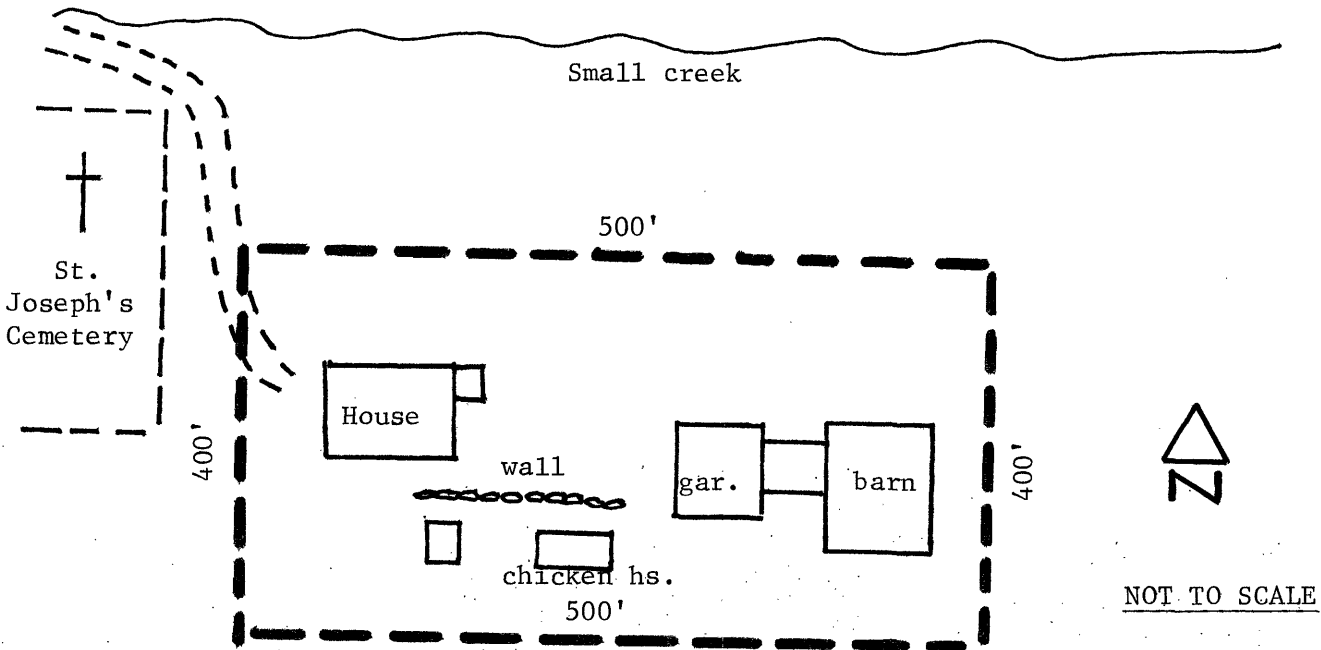

Beginning at a point approximately 600' east of Four Mile Pike and 100' east of St. Joseph's Church Cemetery, proceed east 500', then proceed south 400', then proceed west 500', then proceed north along gravel driveway until the point of origin. Boundaries include stone house, bank barn, garage, and frame sheds.
