PHYSICAL DESCRIPTION

This one-story house probably originated as an adobe Sonoran-style structure. It was later modified into a bungalow-style building by the addition of a veranda on three sides and a large low sloping hipped roof with a dual-vented shed dormer centered on the front hip. Presently, board and batten clad additions infill the veranda leaving only a small front porch. Further stuccoed additions extend from the northeast corner to a stuccoed outstructure with a gabled roof of corrugated metal. The wood-shingled roof of the main structure has been replaced by asphalt shingles. The front door is off-center. Two three-light aluminum windows appear on each end of the veranda additions. Other wood casement windows are irregular in size and placement.

According to current owners, the existing veranda and modification of the house to its present Bungalow-style character occurred circa 1918. This is documented by the 1919 and 1920 dates of the accompanying historic photographs. The only subsequent alteration to the house was the enclosure of the end bays of the veranda circa 1940. The remainder of the house retains its original elements.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE/HISTORY

This house is significant as the residence of Judge William T. Day, who built the original home around 1886. Day had been a school teacher in Virginia and Illinois before coming to Arizona in 1882. He was superintendent and general manager of the Vekol Mine in 1888, and also prospected for copper, iron and gold. He was elected to the territorial legislature in 1891 and served during the seventeenth session. After leaving the Vekol, he established a trading post among the Papago Indians, and served as Justice of the Peace. After retiring in 1918, Judge Day, with his son Darby, built the San Carlos Hotel adjacent to his home.

The Day House is also significant as one of Casa Grande's earliest houses.

The original house dates to 1886 and represents the earliest adobe residences associated with the initial settlement of Casa Grande. The addition of the porch, circa 1918, gives it a striking Bungalow-inspired design illustrative of early twentieth century architectural styles.
