DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Rankin Block in Rockland, Maine, built in 1853, is a large and well-preserved example of a late Greek Revival style commercial building. The $3\frac{1}{2}$ -story block is of brick construction with gabled roof, six chimneys, granite foundation, and granite trim. The block, which faces east, consists of four units, those on the ends being 4 bays wide, while those in the middle are 3 bays in width. Fenestration above the first story was originally 6/6, and this has survived in places; elsewhere it has been replaced with 2/2. All windows feature granite sills and lintels

The half-story on the facade contains 4 gabled dormers with triangular pediments. A shed-roofed dormer above the northernmost unit contains two pairs of 2/2 windows; this presumably replaced a pair of gabled dormers as at the south end, and it is the only significant alteration to the building's exterior. The first story of the facade is framed in large granite posts and lintels. These define the four street-level stores. The store entrances consist of recessed double-doors, flanked by display windows. In the center of the facade, between the second and third stories, is a carved granite panel with raised letters which reads: "RANKIN BLOCK 1853". The entablature is decorated with a pattern of slightly projecting bricks which mimic dentils. The 3-bay-wide gable-ends and rear elevation of the block typically lack the detailing of the facade, but the windows are trimmed in granite.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Rankin Block is a well-designed Greek Revival commercial building built in 1853 by Samuel Rankin, a descendant of Constant Rankin, one of the first settlers in the region.

The building faces the harbor and was at the center of activity during Rockland's most prosperous years as a thriving seaport.

The present structure was erected on the site of an earlier commercial building, also called the Rankin Block, which was destroyed in the disastrous fire of 1853.

Symbolic of Rockland's remarkable recovery from this holocaust, the Rankin Block, now scheduled for rehabilitation and reuse as elderly housing, will long continue as a landmark on the waterfront.

The ground floor facade of the Rankin Block is a prime example of the heavy trabeated granite construction so typical of Maine commercial architecture of the mid-19th century particularly in seaport areas.

During Rockland's primacy as a lime exporting seaport in the latter half of the 19th century the Rankin Block was used by various different businesses related to maritime commerce. These included a ship chandlery, shipping offices, and, in the top floor, a sail loft. Form No. 10-300a (Rev. 10-74)
