Saint George's Chapel is a brick structure, laid in Flemish bond, with a brick tower on the southwest corner. Overall dimensions are 42' by 32'.

The chapel originally had an upper story of windows that lighted the gallery. There were two doors on each side wall, but no west door. The original roof was not as steep as the present neo-gothic one. The interior has been restored to its original arrangement, except for the upper windows.

The floor plan features two side aisles and cross-aisles in front and back. A gallery extends the full length of the south, north and west walls, and is supported by round columns. The windows, pews, and pulpit, are modern replacements, since the original furnishings were removed in 1850 and 1882. A tall pulpit with a sounding board stands behind the Holy Table, in front of the restored Palladian window. In the 1966 restoration, certain Victorian features, including some stained glass and the Holy Table, were intentionally retained to serve as reminders of the changes that the church has undergone.

The site of St. George's Chapel was bought in 1706 by a group of Anglicans, but no edifice was erected until 1719. The first regular minister, William Beckett, arrived in 1721 as a missionary from the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel. The congregation worshipped in this frame building until 1792, when it was destroyed by fire. The present chapel, completed in 1794, was built of bricks fired in a clamp that still can be seen in the woods nearby. The single-center plan, with the pulpit in the chancel, was unusual but not unknown in Anglican worship.

In 1850 the box pews and the original pulpit were removed, the Palladian window on the east was blocked up, new narrower windows were put in the lower story, and a vestibule was erected in the west end.

The chapel was again modernized in 1882, when the walls were cut down and the present high-pitched roof was installed. The side galleries were removed, and a triple lancet window was installed in the east wall. At the same time, the side windows were given pointed tops, and the vestibule was removed. A porch was added to the southwest doorway in 1916 and replaced in 1955 with the present tower.

Restoration in 1966, under the direction of Allen Wood Fraser, A.I.A., and Samuel C. Russell a local contractor, returned the interior and the openings to nearly their original appearances.
