DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The John Hood residence is a two-story brick and stucco residence rendered in the <u>colonial revival style</u>. Following Federal style lines the house is distinguished by a one-story portico, a bracketed hipped roof with a pair of dormers, and a two-story east side sun porch.

Groups of three Doric columns support the portico's entablature with its triglyph and metope frieze and denticulated cornice. A pair of French doors lead to the balcony atop the portico. Shuttered 8 x 1 double hung sash windows flank the balcony. All other windows are casement, except for the dormers. Planter boxes are below the sun porch's windows.

The interior, with its circular staircase, remains intact. The Federal style fireplace and many of the original sterling silver light fixtures and chandeliers have been preserved. It is the intention of the alumni association to completely restore and refurnish the first floor to its original decor, using the original blueprints as a guideline.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The John Hood residence is architecturally significant as a good example of a late <u>colonial</u> revival style house. Both its exterior and interior details are noteworthy and deserving of preservation. There are less than two dozen houses of this style, comparable in quality and scale, in Idaho, and this is one of the few remaining examples in Pocatello.

John Hood was a merchant whose business operations primarily consisted of the Golden Rule Store chain in Idaho and Utah. As a young man in Wyoming, Hood was a co-worker of J.C. Penney, and ultimately he sold his eleven stores to Penney in 1927, upholding an agreement the pair had made while contemplating future successes in Wyoming. The Hood family retained possession of the house until 1977 when the alumni association purchased it.

Palmer Rogers was an architect in the local firm Boyer and Rogers, one of Pocatello's foremost firms. The firm designed many of the major buildings in southeast Idaho.
