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Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Trosper House (1910) is a large two story frame Colonial Revival residence located on a large lot in the small town of Greenwood. The property includes the house, a kitchen building, a pumphouse, a shed, two servants cottages, and the original fence. Alterations have been fairly minimal; hence the property retains its National Register eligibility.

According to the family history, there was a previous Trosper House near the site. When the present house was built, the old house was used as rental property for "a couple of years" and then demolished. The story continues that the lumber was used for "servants houses," but it is not known whether all the present outbuildings were actually built from the old house. It is, however, certain that all five of the existing frame outbuildings are roughly contemporaneous with the present main house.

The main house is essentially a greatly enlarged "American foursquare" enriched with a two column colossal portico superimposed on a wraparound front gallery. The massing is enlivened by a pair of two story polygonal bays under gables and a large forward-facing dormer. There are also two single story polygonal bays set under the front gallery. The bays, of course, are carryover features from the Queen Anne Revival, as is the living hall on the interior. The floor plan makes considerable use of forty-five degree angles. This is seen in the form of corner fireplaces, polygonal bays, and diagonal interior walls. Most of the principal rooms open onto each other through pairs of wide pocket doors, thus creating a fairly open interior. Most of the windows are 16 over 1, and most of the principal doors feature transoms.

Noteworthy decorative features include:

- (1) The fluted Ionic columns on the portico.
- (2) The twelve Ionic columns on the front gallery.
- (3) The scroll brackets under the corners of the gables.
- (4) The second story balcony balustrade under the portico.
- (5) The richly paneled newel post on the main staircase.
- (6) The columnar oak mantel-overmantel sets.

The house is linked to the rear kitchen dependency by a covered walk which has since been screened in. Other alterations include the installation of plywood paneling in a front room and the refitting of a rear room for a kitchen. These changes, of course, are fairly minor.

Contributing Elements:

Because the dependencies are roughly contemporaneous and illustrate the type of support structures a pretentious early twentieth century town residence would have had, all five are listed as contributing elements. Indeed, it is very unusual to find a historic residence with so many surviving period outbuildings.



Statement of Significance (in one paragraph) Criterion ${\mathcal C}$

The Trosper House is locally significant in the area of architecture as <u>the</u> local landmark in the incorporated town of Greenwood.

Greenwood, onetime contender for Caddo Parish seat, is an agricultural community in the path of the expanding greater Shreveport metroplex. Today it consists of a few hundred structures, about sixty of which are over fifty years old. Virtually all of the older structures date from the early twentieth century, the majority being bungalows or simple galleried cottages. There are also a few relatively plain Queen Anne Revival cottages. It is against this background that the landmark status of the Trosper House emerges. To begin with, it is by far the largest older residence in town and the only one that is a full two stories. Secondly, it is the only residence with a colossal columnar portico. Thirdly, it has a fully developed living hall, which is a rare feature in the area. Finally, it retains an unusually large number of period outbuildings.
