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DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Munger Terrace is situated on a steeply sloping site four blocks above the central business district of Duluth. The principal facade utilizes the entire oneblock length of the site. Immediately in front of the building is an expanse of open space, a large portion of which is now devoted to parking for tenants' automobiles, but was formerly a park-like setting for flower beds and fountains.

Designed in 1891 and completed in 1892, Munger Terrace is a massive stone and brick structure four storeys in height. The facade treatment employs a complex variation of architectural elements which results in a highly individualized and asymmetrical expression in the Chateauesque mode. The termini of the principal facade are circular towers with dormered conical roofs. Throughout the facade, spatial variation is provided through projecting pavilions and towers and arched recesses. The dominant pivotal feature is a five storey dormered pavilion; the lower level is of rusticated stone, the second level employs pairs of round arched windows, the third and fourth levels are incorporated within a series of six brick pilasters, and the fifth level is crowned with a soaring roof adorned with iron cresting.

The main roof is basically a steeply pitched slate mansard which incorporates a variety of wall and roof dormers in groupings; each grouping is treated with a different gable treatment highlighted with embossed medalions, curved or straight parapets, and finials.

Originally Munger Terrace comprised eight spacious apartments of sixteen rooms each. The individualized variety of the exterior was echoed in the interior detailing and plan. In 1915, the building was remodeled to provide thirty-two apartment units which were often rented to immigrants to Duluth in later years when the area experienced deterioration. Since 1915 little modification has taken place, and the building has retained a substantial degree of original exterior and interior design integrity.

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STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Since the time of its construction, Munger Terrace has been considered one of Duluth's most architecturally significant apartment buildings. Designed in 1891 by Duluth architects Oliver Traphagen and Francis Fitzpatrick, this complex of eight luxury apartments of sixteen rooms each which afforded an unobstructed view of Lake Superior, was completed in 1892. It was owned by Roger S. Munger, a prominent early developer of Duluth's grain, lumber, and coal businesses.

From its completion until 1895, Munger Terrace was rented and occupied by the newly-formed Sacred Heart Academy which was the predecessor of the present College of St. Scholastica. During the remainder of the 1890s and into the turn of the century Munger Terrace was considered one of the most fashionable Duluth addresses. The interior of the building was remodelled to provide for thirtytwo apartments in 1915, however, no changes were made on the exterior and much of the interior detailing was retained.

Munger Terrace remains today as Duluth's finest example of the Chateauesque mode as applied to residential/apartment architectural design.
