The Mount Saint Scholastica Convent building, which is situated in the south part of Atchison on the campus of Mount Saint Scholastica College, is a four-story U shaped structure. The north wing of the building is the chapel, while the rest of the building houses the convent facilities. The exterior walls are of red face brick laid in common running bond. Native limestone trim is used to accent windows, doors, and other important features. The building sits on a massive rough stone foundation, which is partially exposed above grade. A cut stone water table with a beveled face links the stone base to the brick walls.

The steep pitched gable roof is covered with shingles. Large dominant dormers project from the gable roof, giving it a rhythmic modulation. A square brick tower located at the intersection of the two convent wings rises several stories above the roof line. The tower has a steeply sloped hip roof with an ornament at the peak and small dormers projecting from each side of the tower roof. Square minarets are located at the four corners of the tower, at each end of the roof gables and on each side of the dormers.

Windows on the first floor are simple rectangular openings with cut stone sills and shallow arched heads of brick. Windows on the second and third stories are coupled vertically by a recessed Second floor windows are rectangles with stone sills brick spandrel. while third floor windows have semicircular arched heads with decorative brick arches coupled in horizontal pairs. This detail gives a strong vertical accent to the building facade. The fourth floor is contained behind the gable roof and is separated from the brick portion by an ornamental cornice featuring a dentil treatment. This same cornice design is used around the roof gables and dormers. Windows for the fourth floor are in the dormers and the gable Dormer windows are in groups of three with semicircular arched heads. Windows in the gable ends are simple rectangles separated individually by brick pilasters.

The chapel wing is one story with a gable roof. Its windows are slender, vertical openings with semicircular heads. Flying buttresses are used around the apse of the chapel. These buttresses are of brick trimmed with stone and terminated by minarets. A spire rises from the roof above the apse.

Except for the addition to the west at the southwest corner and the adjacent construction of new buildings, the exterior appearance of Mount Saint Scholastica Convent has been altered very little.

The building, which is in good condition, is basically Renaissance in design with some Gothic evidences in the buttresses and tower.



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The Mount Saint Scholastica Convent, located on the campus of Mount Saint Scholastica College in Atchison, was completed in 1901 at a cost of \$65,000. The convent had been established in Atchison in 1863 by Rev. Mother Evangelista Kremeter and six other Sisters of the Benedictine Order. The Sisters organized an elementary school on December 1, 1863, and this became an academy for girls in 1866. In 1877 the Sisters acquired Price Villa at the south end of the city for use as a convent and academy and renamed it St. Cecilia's. Other buildings were planned and constructed on the campus as the convent and academy prospered. Planning for a new convent building began in 1889, but construction was delayed until 1899 The large brick and stone building, which was completed two years later, housed the convent and a chapel. Prior to the construction of the administration building in 1924, Mount Saint Scholastica Convent was the largest and the main building on the campus.

Both the school and the convent continued to grow. Junior college courses were added in 1926 and a four-year college program in 1930. The convent community had grown from seven in 1863 to more than 600 by the mid-1950's. By the 1950's the convent was supplying teachers for 80 schools in Kansas, Missouri, Iowa, Nebraska, Colorado, and California.

Besides its important contributions to education in the Atchison area, the Mount Saint Scholastica Convent building has significant architectural interest. It is a fine Kansas example of a large educational building executed in Renaissance-influenced architecture enhanced by Gothic touches in the buttresses and towers.
