18. the entry is a extended bay containing three, round-arched openings separated by carved pilasters. This window group is capped by an incised pediment similar to the one over the portico. In the second story, tall, narrow windows are capped by stone hoods with carved stops. The smaller, third-story windows are round-arched and have similar hoods. The structure is crowned by an extended cornice with corner brackets and s-shaped modillions which continue around the four sides. The building also features a three-story, projecting bay on both the north and south sides and an original, two-story rear section.
