Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The former Clovis Baptist Hospital, a two-story stuccoed hipped box of hollow clay tile construction, stands as it was originally built in 1919. The cross-hipped roof, with its exposed rafters, expresses the formal, symmetrical plan of the Hospital. 6/6 double-hung wood sash windows are recessed with simple lug sills. Curved walls flank the entry steps. A projecting flat-roofed entry portico with square, stuccoed columns leads to the double-leaf, transommed entry door. The combination of stuccoed surfaces, recessed ribbon windows, austere porch columns, and broad roof overhang lend a slightly Prarie Style quality to this otherwise institutional structure; while a pedimented porte cochére supported with Doric columns and an associated pergola arbor lend classical elements and a somewhat residential quality to the structure. The only exterior renovation has been the recent replacement of the original wood shingles with new wood shingles. Although the interior use has been converted to a restaurant and shop spaces, the original hardwood floors, ceiling heights, interior stairs, doors, trim, bathroom fixtures, and hardware have been retained. The original boiler, converted to gas, still heats the building. The integrity of the Hospital's appearance and construction is intact.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The construction of the Clovis Baptist Hospital was the result of a post-World War I drive by Clovis Baptists to build the first hospital in eastern New Mexico. The structure is one of few survivors of a style and substance once prevalent in Clovis. The community of Clovis, established with the arrival of the A.T. & S.F. Railroad, consisted of - in 1907 - a siding and a few shacks. By 1908 the railroad had constructed its Mission Style depot, followed by a Southwest Style Harvey House. These architect-designed structures undoubtedly influenced the construction of Clovis' subsequent civic buildings, including the Hospital. In addition to its architectural merit, the Hospital was significant in the social development of Clovis and the wider region: First Baptist Church, Clovis, opened the hospital on October 7, 1920, as "the only city of refuge on the high plains of eastern New Mexico."

8. SIGNIFICANCE

Shortly after its construction the Hospital - represented by A.W. Hockenhull of the Clovis Church - was offered to the New Mexico Baptists. The 23-bed hospital cost \$35,000 of which \$15,000 had been paid, and the balance was pledged. When the Clovis church had reduced the indebtedness to \$8,228, New Mexico Baptists took over the hospial on October 31, 1924. Reported Clovis News: "The only hospital within a radius of 100 miles in either direction opened October 7, 1920, 1000 patients have been admitted, 545 surgical, 270 medical, 94 obstetrical, and 91 births." The hospital "paid its way from the beginning," reported Baptist New Mexican, October 4, 1923. "Not only has it paid operating expenses, but all improvements and repairs from hospital fees."

The hospital served the community for 19 years, closing its doors in 1939 after the City decided to build a modern facility. On November 21, 1939, the hospital was sold for \$5,000 to a Mr. and Mrs. Ramsey who operated it as a hotel. The current owner acquired the property in 1981. It is in use as a restaurant and gallery complex, "The Landmark."
