7. Description

The Thomas Hamilton House of Calais, Maine, built c.1857, is a well-preserved and distinctive example of the vernacular Italianate style in a relatively remote geographical context.

The three-story house is of frame construction with low-pitched hipped roof, brick chimney, monitor of high profile, bracketed cornices, and clapboard siding with wooden quoins.

The three-bay facade, which faces southeast, is dominated by a first floor porch which runs the full width of the house covering a central entrance; this porch also has a bracketed cornice, as well as elaborate trim above the four posts which support it. Facade fenestration consists of paired 2/2 windows surmounted by entablatured lintels with miniature brackets. On the other three walls of the house the windows are single 2/2, as are those in the monitor. A three-sided bay window faces South-west.

Attached to the rear of the house is a small, summer porch with gabled roof, 2/2 windows, and a door facing northeast. This was added in the mid-20th century.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

This extremely pretentious (for its location) and unusually designed Italianate house may reflect in its unique qualities the character flaws of its first owner. Nevertheless, it stands as a landmark in Calais, known over the years as "Hamilton's Folly".

Thomas L. Hamilton was apparently a businessman who in his early career experienced certain modest success. Evidently his prosperity went to his head. He began to dress astentatiously, bought expensive horses and carriages and built his fine house on South Street as a symbol of his position, as he imagined it, in the community. Registry records show that a series of mortgages were soon engaged in and in a very short span of time Mr. Hamilton had lost his house, his horses and all else. It is recorded that he died in the poorhouse.

At one time the house was owned by the Orthodox Congregational Church of St. Stephen, New Brunswick, across the river. In 1916 and 1923 it was owned by two different banks indicating, perhaps, other unlucky owners. More recently it became the residence of Clarence B. Beckett, mayor of Calais in 1935 and later a member of the Governor's Council. During this period at least two Maine Governors were overnight guests.
