DESCRIPTION:

Whitney School is a low, horizontal one-story stucco-over-brick building with parapet roof and large multi-paned windows. Three entrances display fanlights and other stylized ornamentation derived from classical motifs. The central entry is set in a projecting bay and flanking entrances are spaced irregularly in the Simple geometric designs adorn the stucco walls, and there is an addifacade. tional arched entry in the north facade. The original central unit of the school was designed by Wayland & Fennell in 1926 to replace an old box-type school which In 1936 Tourtellotte and Hummel designed additional wings for the burned down. north and south ends of the building, and finally in 1946 a large wing was added to the south end of the school. The result of all these additions is that the school has a somewhat sprawling effect, although this is counteracted by the consistent use of classical detail and uniform roofline, fenestration, materials, and scale The alterations described are combatible with the historical charthroughout. acter of the bulding and constitute all major alterations.

SIGNIFICANCE:

Whitney School is one of two one-story schools in the Thematic Group. Controversy over the merits of the one-story building still flourished, but in this case the school board chose the new concept of the single-story design over the traditional two-story building. However, it was not until after the Second World War that the single-story school building was widely accepted by the area; thus Whitney was an unusual departure from accepted practice.

In 1936 when WPA labor was available, a wing was added to each end of the building, providing additional classrooms and a lunchroom/kitchen/playroom facility. The provision of hot lunch in school was an innovation shared with Cole and Central schools and reflected the expanding social role of the schools.
