## Verbal Boundary Description

The boundary begins at point A (see U.S.G.S. map) on the east side of U.S. 62 and follows the private drive in an southeasterly direction for approximately 1800 feet to point B. The line then turns north for approximately 400 feet to point C. From point C, the line runs northwest for approximately 700 feet to point D on U.S. 62. The line then follows the east side of U.S. 62 for approximately 300 feet to the point of origin.
