Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

St. James' Episcopal Church is located on a five-acre tract of land at the northeast corner of Kentucky Highway 146 and Maple Avenue in Pewee Valley, Kentucky. The tract contains a number of large deciduous trees and evergreens, as well as other plantings which add to the rural ambience of the site. (Photo 1)

Three buildings make up the church complex - the church (built in 1869), the education building which is connected to the church (built in 1965), and the rectory (built in 1911). The church is a one-story structure of native Pewee Valley limestone quarried not far from the site. It is a small building in a rural Gothic Revival style with a square tower at the northwest corner. The tower has a bellcast steeple and contains the entry and vestibule. Pointed-arch windows of clear glass (much of it original) alternate with stone buttresses on the side walls. There is a rose window of stenciled colored glass in the northwest gable facade. The interior is simple and has had few alterations. There are plain dark-stained wooden cross beams below the ceiling. The altar bay contains three pointed-arch windows with stenciled glass in shades of grey, red, green, and gold. The oak pews are original. (Photos 2, 3, 4)

The rectory was built in 1911 using stone from the same quarry for the front gable facade. It is a Stick style building with stucco and half-timber trim and has two stories. The eductation building, Board Hall, was built in 1965 also of stone from the same quarry which supplied stone for the church and rectory. It is a one-story structure with round-arched windows and is joined to the church at the southwest corner. (Photo 5)

The Church and Rectory are contributing buildings while the Education Building is non-contributing.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

St. James' Episcopal Church is significant under Criterion C as an example of a rural Gothic Revival-style church. It is also significant as the work of William Henry Redin (1822-1904), a Louisville, Kentucky architect who was well-known as an "ecclestiastical architect and builder".

The asymmetrical form of the church, with a square corner tower, lancet windows, and buttresses along the walls, all combine to create an excellent adoptation of the simple Gothic Revival style often found in rural parishes in England.

St. James Church was organized in 1858 in Pewee Valley, a small community in Oldham County, Kentucky. At first, services were held in the Rollington Methodist Church. In 1868 the vestry commissioned former Confederate General E. Kirby Smith to canvass the area for contributions for a building. The church was completed in 1869 at a cost of \$4,000.00. According the the vestry minutes, the plans of B. Talbott were accepted, but William H. Redin completed the church. Nothing is known of B. Talbott as an architect, nor are there other known buildings attributed to him. The design of St. James' is similar to other churches designed by Redin, who designed both large city churches and several small rural churches in the Gothic Revival style. Redin also used native Pewee Valley limestone for several of his churches.

William Henry Redin was born in suffolk County, England and came to this country by the 1840's. Trained as an artist, he exhibited at the National Academy of Design in New York in 1848 and 1849. His earliest documented architectural works in Louisville were completed in the 1860's. He designed commercial buildings, residences, and a number of churches in Louisville and in nearby towns. He employed the Gothic Revival style for his churches and several were small buildings in rural settings. At the same time he was working on St. James' Church, he was completing the Anchorage Presbyterian Church in Jefferson County (which adjoins Oldham County). (National Register 1980). Redin lived in Pewee Valley for several years and is buried there.
