DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Officers' Row Historic District is located on a bluff overlooking the industrial area of the Puget Sound Naval Shipyard. The facility was established at this location by 1896, with the construction of Quarters A, B, C, D and E. The Neo-Classical style of these five buildings established the predominant architectural theme for all the officers' quarters in the shipyard. Quarters constructed between 1903 and 1913, as well as five constructed between 1899 and 1905 and moved from other areas of the yard complete the composition of this linear district of housing.

These two story wood frame buildings have attics and basements. Each, set on the curving line of the bluff edge, is sited with front and side yards landscaped with lawn and native plants. Beyond each house are rear yards or gardens separated from the quarters by Peary Road. The Officers' Row Historic District contains fifteen residential buildings plus their garages. Apart from the latter buildings there has been no major construction activity in the area since 1919. There are no intrusions and, with minor alterations, all the buildings have retained their architectural integrity and have been well maintained.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Officers' Row Historic District is significant because it contains an integrated architectural unit of housing representative of this function within the Puget Sound Naval Shipyard Shore Facility. Constructed between 1896 and 1913, the buildings in this district symbolize the navy's need to provide adequate housing for the officers responsible for all the activities associated within the shipyard and industrial area.

Officers' Quarters A, B, C, D and E were designed by the Seattle architectural firm of Chamberlin and Siebrand in 1896. This style established the predominant architectural theme for all the officers' quarters in the shipyard. These buildings formed a linear core from which newer quarters were added between 1910 and 1913. This expansion paralleled the general expansion of the yard, an activity which also saw the construction of Drydock No. 2, and the creation of the Radio Station, the Marine Reservation and the Hopsital Reservation at new locations.

By 1919, the present district configuration was completed. To the north this includes the house, built in 1903, for Fred G. Forbes, Chief Clerk of the Commandant of the shipyard. In addition, the 1899 Marine Officer's quarters was moved into the complex. To the south of the original officers group, four warrant officer quarters were moved into this area in 1919 from their location closer to the shoreline. These buildings had been constructed by 1905. After the 1919 date no additional major construction took place within this area.

This housing was, and continues to be, the residences for officers at the shipyard as well as for their families. Quarters C has traditionally been the home of the yard commandant. Quarters Q traditionally housed the public works officer. Among its many residents was Ben Moreell who ultimately became the chief of the Bureau of Yards and Docks during World War II and is attributed with forming the "Seabees." Collectively, this district illustrates how the navy developed this specific component of a shore facility within the Puget Sound Naval Shipyard.

The kitchen has vinyl foor, painted wood cabinets and countertops of plastic laminate, stainless steel and varnished oak. A small bath has VAT flooring.

Building 138 was constructed as a private civilian residence. The building is wood frame two story residence with hip roof. The siding is 6 inch drop siding with trim boards. Windows are wood frame and sash with 1 over 1 lights.

An enclosed porch on the north elevation serves as the entrance. The porch is constructed of wood with glass lights and is covered by a combination hip and shed roof.

In the southeastern corner of the building there are porticos, one above the other. The upper portico is enclosed with glazed walls while the lower portico remains open with wooden railing.

On the north elevation a series of small fixed windows, set high in the wall extend from the entry porch to the west corner of the building.

Earliest construction documents for Building 138 include exterior elevations of the Forbes residence and are undated. These documents carry the signature of E.R. Gayler, Public Works Officer. Gayler was Public Works Officer from 1920 to 1924, and circa 1938.

The interior of Quarters (L) consists of oak floors on the main floor, fir above and plaster on wood lath for walls and ceilings. The entry hall has a closed stairway and a cased opening to the living room. The living room has a 5 foot high wood wainscot with molded cap and a fireplace of rusticated granite capped by a wood mantle. The hearth is made of quarry tile.

Another cased opening connects the living room to the dining room. The dining room has

Building 138 was originally constructed in 1903 as a residence for F.G. Forbes, Chief Clerk to the Commandant of the Puget Sound Naval Shipyard. As a civilian quarters on the shipyard property, the design of the building and its location set it apart from other quarters. The design, of unknown origin, is significantly distinct from contemporary shipyard residential design.

F.G. Forbes, Chief Clerk to the Commandant, was a civilian employee of the shipyard from 1894 to 1937. Serving the shipyard Commandant for 43 years, Mr. Forbes worked for several Commandants and participated in the major developments of the shipyard including the 1919-1921 major expansion of the shipyard industrial and supply area. 

(cont'd) square newel posts and square spindles. The floors are varnished fir, ceilings are 8 feet in height and baths have vinyl and VAT flooring. Upstairs doors are 5 panel. Downstairs doors are 1 panel. The basement has 7½ foot ceilings, concrete floor and walls of concrete and wood. Partitions are wood. An office and bath are in the basement as is a garage for one car.

CONTINUATION of SIGNIFICANCE

Building 138 remains in its unique position, separated from the other residences along Officer's Row. It has experienced minor alterations to its interior with modernization of its plumbing and electrical wiring and updating of its kitchen and baths. Architectural details and workmanship are of superior quality with the use of common building materials of the period. Building 138 has been well maintained.

The second floor is 8 ft in height with central hall. Doorways have transoms overhead. Bedroom with fireplace has wood mantle with no chimneypiece.

The third floor has wood floors for two bedrooms and a bath.

Building 616 is a single car garage with a flat roof, beveled siding and concrete slab floor.

Officers Quarters (S) is a two story wood frame building with attic and basement. The roof is hipped with hip roofed dormers. A projecting entry porch on the south elevation is composed of a pair of unfluted modified "Etruscan" columns with capitals and bases on each side of the descending stairs. Railings are simple milled uprights with rectangular cap. Railings terminate in simple newel posts. The exterior siding is bevel siding with 6 inch exposure and trim boards. The base is concrete installed when the building was relocated to this site in 1919. The entry door includes an overhead transom light. Windows are wood doublehung multi-paned upper units with a large center pane and with the lower unit consisting of two lights. A small side porch to the west is flat roofed and supported by two 6 inch square columns.

The interior of Quarter (S) has plaster on wood lath walls and ceiling and oak floors on the 1st and 2nd floors. The entry has a 3 ft high panelled wainscot. The central stairway serves the 2 nd floor through an oval shaped archway. The stair is open with square spindles separated by large wooden beads. The treads are varnished wood with painted risers. The living room is panelled and containing a fireplace with wood surround, mantle and chimneypiece containing a mirror. Glazed tile surrounds the firebox. The dining room is panelled with fireplace similar to living room. A corner cupboard is built-in to dining room corner. Ceilings are 9 feet. A small half bath has vinyl floor and painted walls. Pantry and kitchen have vinyl floors, painted wood cabinets with glass



Officer's Quarters S (Bldg. 615) was constructed in 1899 as Officer's quarters for the first Marine Reservation at the Puget Sound Naval Shipyard and is a significant structure of the personnel facilities of this shore facility. It is the only remaining structure of this early period. Originally located in the vicinity of Building 469 (Puget Sound Naval Shipyard Grid D.50), the building served as quarters until a new site for the Marine Reservation was established at the western region of the shipyard. The building was moved in 1919 to its present locaton to make way for redevelopment of its site as part of the industrial area.

As the only remaining structure of the earlier marine reservation establishment, it serves as a well preserved architectural component of the 1899 Marine Reservation (cont'd on back)









and the later and current Officer's Row. Building 615 represents the initial establishment of the Marine Corps at the Puget Sound Naval Shipyard. This original establishment in 1896 provided the initial 20 men security force for the shipyard under the Command of First Sergeant George Carter.

The first Marine Reservation was established in the area now occupied by Buildings 871 and 469. It consisted of Building 615 and a Marine Barracks Building and two out-buildings. Located on the northern shipyard property line between Chester and Warren Streets, this area was redeveloped in 1920 into the industrial area usage.

Relocated in 1919, Building 615 was converted from Marine Officer's Quarters to Navy Officer's Quarters. The relocation was completed with the original building remaining intact with the exception of a newly constructed basement. (see continuation sheet)

The Building has been maintained in good repair with an adjacent garage, Building 616, the only addition. Alterations of the interior have been restricted to modernization of the kitchen and baths.



The attic has painted wood floors and a bath with VAT in (0) and linoleum in (P). The basement has concrete walls and floors and a ceiling height of 7 feet. (continued on back) Building 618 (Quarters 0 & P) is a duplex of two stories with basement and attic. The building is framed with hipped roof with composition shingles. The attic includes hipped dormers.

The main entries are at opposite (east and west) ends of the building. The south elevation contains a recess with four large unfluted columns with "Ionic" capitals. The entry porches have flat roofs with supports of modified "Etruscan" unfluted columns. A decorated frieze with plain brackets is at the building eave while an undecorated frieze appears over the porches. The siding is bevel siding with trimmed corners. Windows are wood, double-hung sash with 10 over 1 and 8 over 1 lights. The entry door includes a large glass light and has side lights and transom.

At the rear of the building (north elevation) there are enclosed porches with glazed openings. Additions to the kitchens were made in 1927. These are one story additions to the rear.

The interior of 618 consists of oak floors and walls and ceilings of plaster on wood lath. The entry hall contains a stairway to the second floor and cased openings to the living room and dining room. The living room has a fireplace with wood surround supporting a wood mantle. The fireplace is flanked by bookcases in (P) and one bookcase (left side) in (O). Ceilings are 9 ft. on first and second floors. Kitchens have painted wood cabinets. (O)'s kitchen has VAT floor and (P)'s is vinyl. Pantry matches kitchen and have plastic laninate countertops. The stairways have square newel posts and turned spindles. Second floor



Building 618 was constructed in 1910 as the second and last duplex quarters building of the shipyard's Officers Row. Designed with neo-classical details, Building 618 was constructed with the unusual side yard orientation to the other buildings of the Officers Row. When constructed in 1910, it was the eastern most building of Officers Row and contributed to the then seven building composition.

Building 618 served as Quarters (0) and (P) providing quarters for Senior Assistant-Hull Division (0) and the Inspection Officer (P). In 1924 Quarters (0) was assigned to the Aide to the Commandant. In 1926 Quarters (0) was assigned to the Assistant Inside Superintendent of Ordinance, Electric and Radio, while Quarters (P) was assigned to the Assistant Production Superintendent-Hull. 

Building 617 and 619 are one car, detached garages with flat roofs, bevel siding and concrete slabs.

Machinery Superintendent while Quarters (P) was assigned to the Assistant Shop Superintendent. In 1943 Quarters (0) was assigned to the Assistant Production Officer-Machinery while Quarters (P) was assigned to the Assistant Production Officer-Hull. These assignement remained until the end of World War II.

Building 618 was built in 1910 from designs by the Navy Yard Puget Sound under the direction of Public Works Officer, Civil Engineer, P.L. Reed, U.S.N. The design exhibits the classical details of "Ionic" and "Etruscan" columns, a decorated freize with brackets and other features common to the other quarters along Officers Row. The design utilizes a composition of side by side units with the entries at the side yard facing adjacent buildings. The front of Decatur Street elevation is the side of the duplex with large "Ionic" capitaled, unfluted columns within (see continuation sheet)

Building 618 has remained in its original location overlooking the industrial yard but additional Quarters (615 and 138) have completed the eastern boundary of Officers Row. The building has experienced the addition of a covered enclosed porch at the rear and modernization of electrical wiring and plumbing. The building has been well maintained.

Building 621 is a wood frame residence measuring 60 feet by 55 feet in an irregular form, having two stories with attic formed by a hip roof. The front of the building includes a large porch at the entry. The porch with its flat roof supported by unfluted columns with "Ionic" capitals and bases includes a balustrade containing turned balusters and crowned railing. The entry door and window exhibit a 'Palladian' motif of centered door and window with side light on either side. The bay window and entry sidelight are designed with leaded glass panels. The operable units of the bay window as well as other windows are 1 over 1 lights. siding is white painted bevel siding with 4 inch

(cont'd) The stairway has square newel posts and turned spindles with the lower section containing bead and dowel fretwork. The library has wood bookcase and a fireplace with cast iron front and wood trim and mantle with ceramic tile surround (small firebox). The living room contains a fireplace with wood mantle and trim. The dining room has a fireplace with "Ionic" columns supporting a wood



Building-621 is one of five original Officer's Residences constructed at the time of the establishment of the Puget Sound Naval Shipyard. Built in 1896, this residence has always dominated the ridge overlooking the industrial area of the shipyard. Designed by the Seattle architectural firm of Chamberlin and Siebrand, Architects, it is one of few buildings designed by civilians at the shipyard.

Building 621, construction in 1896, with its neo-classical detailing, set the design of subsequent residences along Officer's Row. Building 621 was designed within a composition of four other quarters, Buildings 623,624,626 and 628. 
Building 631 was the first duplex Officer's Quarters constructed along Officer's Row at the Puget Sound Naval Shipyard. Constructed in 1903 it was the western edge of the Officer's Row overlooking the Shipyard. Building 631 was the first addition to the original five quarters of Officer's Row constructed in 1896. It was the first residence of Officer's Row to be designed by the shipyard personnel. It was designed by the Navy Yard Puget Sound under the direction of Civil Engineer, A.C. Lewerenz, U.S.N.



(cont'd) stairway connecting the first and second floors. The stair is composed of turned spindles and decorated square newel posts. The stairs are painted with black on tread and risers, white on spindles and newel posts with black caps.

The kitchen has vinyl floors, plastic laminate countertops and painted wood cupboards. The 3rd floor contains linoleum floor covering and fir floors. The attic spaces are utilized for storage. The basement has concrete floors and brick foundation walls and timber columns. An exterior "jelly cabinet" with open shelves appears to be original.

Building 631 served as Qarters for the Supply Officer, (Quarters F), and the Senior Aid to the Commandant, (Quarters G). In 1922, Quarters (G) became the quarters for the Medical Officer. The assignment of Quarters (F) and (G) did not change until after the conclusion of World War II.

Building 637, Officer's Quarters (H), is a wood framed, 12 story residence with intersecting gambrel roof. The siding is bevel siding with trim boards and with 4 inch exposure. The roof is clad with dark red composition shingles. The entry porch on the south elevation is flat roofed and supported by doubled 8 inch square wood columns. Above the porch is a decorative railing of square balusters and newel posts. Adjacent to the porch is a gambrel roofed dormer which allows access to the porch roof. The windows in the dormer are wood double-hung 9 over 1 units. These three window units are crowned with decorative semi-circular hood molding. The entry door included a simple sopraporta of "Ionic" detailing. The internal chimney of brick was moved with the building in the 1919 relocation. Rear dormers are shed roofed.

The interior of Quarters (H) consists of oak floors on the first floor. Walls and ceilings are plaster on wood lath. Ceilings are 9 feet high. The living room contains an inglenook and open stairway to the second floor. The inglenook is framed by fluted pilasters and an elliptical archway. Garage 638 is a one car garage with gable roof, bevel siding and concrete slab.

Building 639, Officer's Quarters (I), is a wood framed, 12 story, single residence with intersecting gambrel roofs. The siding is bevel siding with 4 inch exposure and with trim borads. 





Building 640, Officer's Quarters (J), is a single residence constructed in 1902 as the Gunner's Quarters. The building is two stories with bevel siding over wood frame construction. The roof is hip design with red composition shingles. The building, having been moved in 1919 for expansion of the industrial area, rests on a concrete foundation. The entry is by way of a small arched vestibule. The entry door has an arched sopraporta above the door. To the right of the entry, the living room appears to have been enlarged by expansion of what was originally a front porch. The windows are wood double-hung units with 6 over 6 lights with some replaced with 1 over 1 lights. Windows in the rear of the building are 2 over 2 doublehung units. The brick chimney dates from the 1919 relocation. In 1929 a garage (#757) was constructed to the west of the residence.

Building-640 was the first Warrant Officer's quarters constructed at the shipyard as a single residence. Constructed in 1901-02 as the Chief Gunner's Residence, it was later moved and converted to Officer's quarters as part of Officer's Row. Building 640 was constructed in 1901-02 from designs of the Department of Navy, Bureau of Yards and Docks. The Public Works Officer was F.W.D. Holbrook, a civil engineer. Constructed in what was then a remote area of the shipyard, it was located above the beach of Sinclair Inlet in the approximate location of the present Building 447. Building 640 was sited above the beach between the ammunition storage facilities and the Charleston Gate. This area of the yard was then an undeveloped area proposed for future shipyard expansion. In 1905, two additional Warrant Officer's quarters were constructed.



In 1920, Building 640 (Quarters J) was converted to Officer's quarters and assign to the Officer in-charge of Outside Superintendent of Machinery Division.







Building 641 was converted into Officer's quarters with the 1919 move. Building 64l is well maintained with its only changes being a rear bedroom addition in 1929 and modernization of plumbing and electrical wiring.
