Secluded down a country lane that runs past fields and woodlands is the neatly kept Vinson homeplace. It is located off Hartford Road high above the Pigeon River in the Pleasant Grove vicinity. The home appears to be a late 19th century Victorian one. The larger portion is Victorian, but, upon closer evaluation, it becomes apparent that some sections of the home are older. The home was built at three The first structure to be constructed on the site different times. was a two-story log home which was assembled in the 1790's when William Vinson first came to the area. Fifty years later another generation added a delivery area and kitchen to the log structure. The last addition occurred in the 1890's when Clay Vinson built a large two-story addition which included a parlor, living room and A polygonal porch surrounds the last addition and gingerbread trim decorates the eaves of the porch and roof. The log structure was clapboarded at the same time and trimmed in complementary fashion.

The farm which lies east of the Pigeon River is much depleted in size from the original tract that William Vinson had received. Much of the land was sold or donated in the scattered development of the area. The Vinsons still farm their land and the old log barn has been modernized. A smokehouse lies at the oldest portion of the home. The yard has been neatly landscaped with shrubs, ivy, and rock garden. Between the home and barn is an iris garden which is set in a geometric pattern. The inside of the home accurately reflects the periods of construction and has not been vastly altered. Antiques have been kept in the family through the six generations. The log portion is no longer inhabited and is used as storage space. The Victorian section is the present living quarters; modern kitchen and bath utilities have been added.

Carolina (as Tennessee was yet to achieve statehood) at twenty-five cents per acre (Jack Vinson still has original grant papers of his forefather). The original Vinson homeplace, a two-story structure of hand hewn log, is now a portion of the impressive Victorian home.

As others settled in the area the Vinson property was sold in various tracts. In 1848 the Pleasant Grove Baptist Church was established by Joseph Manning near the Vinson home; the site was a gift of the Vinson family. William Vinson lived until the Civil War period. He had accumulated moderate wealth before his death as a successful farmer. Six generations of Vinsons have lived in the home for its many years of existence.

The Vinson House remains one of the most significant buildings in Cocke County because of its association with one of the earliest settlers of the area whose descendants still own the house. possesses architectural significance because it represents the progression of architectural styles from the log cabin to the Victorian. These alterations typically reflect the prosperity of the owners.
