


### Physical Description

The eclectic design for this large house, executed by the Charles Thompson firm in 1914, exhibits the firm's simulateous interest and facility in two quite different American architectural styles, the Craftsman and the Georgian Revival, here juxtaposed in one unusual residence. The rectangular two-story block is faced with dark brown brick and capped by a green terra-cotta roof from which protrude three gable roof dormers. A two-story side porch (open at ground level, enclosed above), faced with stucco, projects from the east elevation and features large brackets. Lining the eaves, exposed rafters are visible. The wide sash windows have ten-over-one lights. These details, combined with the varied textures of brick, stucco, and terra-cotta, lend an informal Craftsman flavor to the house. The dominant feature of the design is, however, an unexpectedly dramatic and formal Georgian Revival semi-circular portico featuring four monumental fluted Ionic columns on attic bases with Ionic, capital responds flanking the door. The flat roof of the portico has a balustrade with paneled wooden piers at intervals and urn-shaped balusters. The Ionic columns support a full entablature with dentils and modillions along the cornice. Further classical embellishments are the decorative wood panels with garland motifs over the two front windows on the first floor, and the balustrade which appears over the doorway and beneath the front second story windows. This imposing house is situated on a huge lot at the corner of 18th and Spring Streets in Little Rock, within sight of the Governor's Mansion, diagonally across the street.

#### Statement of Significance

Architecturally significant as one of Charles L. Thompson's more imposing eclectic designs, the Rogers House at 400 West 18th in Little Rock is an outstanding landmark in the Governor's Mansion neighborhood. Positioned on a large lot surrounded by an iron fence the house is a mixture of Craftsman and Georgian Revival styles. The dominant feature of the house is a dramatic and formal Georgian Revival semi-circular portico supported by four fluted Ionic columns on attic bases with Ionic capital responds flanking the door. The two-story, brown brick structure features Craftsman details including exposed rafters, the use of stucco, terracotta and varied brick textures.
