

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Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

Located west of State Highway 567 about five miles northwest of Liberty, the Decatur N. Butler House is an exterior true one-and-a-half story log house that sits upon log posts and fieldstone. The gabled roof features an outside-end brick chimney with stepped base at each gable end. The logs are covered in clapboards except on the first-story facade and within the recessed rear porch. The second-story of the easterly facade is divided into two bays, but the first-story facade is a threebay composition. The windows of the second-story facade are small and filled with single-hung sash, the second-story gable-end windows are unglazed and closed by batten shutters, and all remaining windows are filled with six-over-six, doublehung sash. The easterly facade is fronted by a one-story gallery that was originally supported by chamfered posts, only one of which survives, but additional chamfered posts remain on the recessed rear gallery. At the northern end of the gallery is a water shelf or closet, which is enclosed by spaced vertical boards rather than the usual, more sophisticated lattice enclosure. The door and window surrounds of the facade are unmolded. Access to the interior of the house is provided through a center-bay doorway, which is filled with a board-and-batten door. The interior plan is basically a single-pile plan, two rooms wide, with no central passage and rear "cabinet" rooms flanking a recessed back porch. On the interior of the house, the logs are exposed. The door and window surrounds are unmolded, the interior doors are board-and-batten, and the surviving original mantel piece of the main room is simply an arched wooden mantel piece with no mantel shelf. A partition wall of vertical boards with molded chair rail divides the two front rooms. Access to the second story is by an enclosed stairway that is entered by a series of winders which make a quarter turn to continue in a straight westerly flight along the southern wall of the northern front room. The stairwell is railed on the secondstory level by a railing of rectangular-sectioned balusters and square newels topped by vernacular finials. The second-story consists of one, large unpartitioned space with exposed log walls and a molded baseboard. Extending from the rear is a one-story frame wing with gabled roof and gallery on the southern elevation.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Decatur Butler House is one of the most significant log houses in the state of Mississippi. This significance is based principally on the outstanding integrity of the house. Exceptionally rare in its retention of original detail, the house is an important document for residential log construction of the mid-nineteenth century. Very few log houses from the period have survived into the twentieth century without extensive remodeling. The house has certain features characteristic of Amite County vernacular architecture which include the water shelf enclosing the northern end of the gallery, the use of log posts and fieldstone for foundation piers, chimneys with stepped bases, and the original wide roof overhang on the gable ends. The house gains added significance from its long history of family ownership and from the inclusion of sophisticated details such as a chair rail and baseboard in a rustic log structure. The house was acquired in the mid-nineteenth century by Decatur Butler, whose descendants still own the house. Although the Butler descendants now reside in newer houses on the property adjoining the nominated one-acre house site, the family respects and maintains the residence of their ancestor.

The nominated property forms a four-sided figure with northern and southern boundary lines parallel and forming right angle corners with the western boundary line. The eastern boundary line is formed by the western side of State Highway 567. The northern, southern, and western boundary lines are located 100 feet from the center point of the roof ridge of the house. The nominated property is located in section 29, Township 3N, Range 4E and comprises a tract of slightly less than one acre.
