

This house is significant for its architecture and its association with the exploration and settlement of the Bergen County, New Jersey area. It is a reasonably well preserved example of the Form/Plan Type as shown and more fully described herein. As such, it is included in the Thematic Nomination to the National Register of Historic Places for the Early Stone Houses of Bergen County, New Jersey.



Wiert Banta was married in 1706, hence the building date. The house is mentioned in the road return of 1717 and in a will of 1733. The land was 183 acres from the Hackensack River to Overpeck Creek. Abraham (Abram) Banta lived here during the Revolution and sold the house in 1810. The Schoonmaker family rented the house from A. C. Coe during World War I. Francis Hoth owned it until 1946 when the Hamptons bought it.
