

Summary

The New Home School Building is a single story, novelty sided structure constructed c. 1915 in Plain/Traditional Style.

Elaboration

The New Home School Building is a single story, novelty sided structure constructed c. 1915 in the Plain/Traditional style. Its rectangular, single-room plan has been augmented only by the addition of a hipped, Craftsman style porch on its southern elevation. There are no extant chimneys. The asphalt shingle gable roof and weatherboarded walls rest upon a foundation composed of stone piers.

The southern elevation features a central hipped roof projecting porch supported by slender columns on piers resting on a wide plank floor. Two separate raised-panel wooden doors provide access to different rooms.

The eastern elevation is fenestrated by four double-hung, four-over-four windows. The northern elevation previously exhibited one window which is now boarded over. The western elevation lighting arrangement is identical to that of the eastern. There is no significant ornamentation of the exterior.

The interior, though simple and without ornament, appears as it did when constructed. The unadorned dimensional lumber used for door and window trim provides the only relief from the flat walls and the blackboard and teaching area at the northern end of the room.

Although the exterior of this structure shows signs of neglect and deterioration, it has not been significantly altered since its construction.

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Summary

The New Home School Building (also known as the Pleasant Valley School and as the Possum Trot School), constructed c. 1915 (though some local accounts place the date as early as 1911 or 1912), was erected as a school building to serve one of six small rural school districts in the farm land surrounding the town of Swifton. It is eligible under Criterion C with local significance as the best example of a single room, Plain Traditional style school house from this era and the only known extant example that survives with this high level of integrity.

Elaboration

The town of Swifton was founded in 1873 with the arrival of the St. Louis, Iron Mountain and Southern Railroad running from St. Louis, Missouri to Texas (prior to the arrival of the railroad, the present town site was probably indistinguishable from the flat farm land that surrounds it, and no community as such existed at all). As was the case with so many railroad towns in Arkansas, the town initially grew up around the railroad and owed its entire existence to it and the national transportation network with which it thereby became connected.

Swifton grew steadily, becoming a regional shipping center for the cotton grown on the farm land surrounding the town, and thereby acquiring the associated cotton gins, mercantile stores and lodging facilities that resulted. Though some modest school facilities existed locally prior to this period, as the town prospered the formation of organized school districts became a priority, with new school construction chief among the concerns of local residents, both in town and in the rural surrounding townships. By the first two decades of the twentieth century the community of Swifton and its environs had been divided into a total of six school districts. By far the majority of these six districts were created to serve students living in remote, rural areas, well away from Swifton proper. Though few historic photographs survive to document the architectural character of these buildings, knowledge of the buildings constructed by small, rural school districts around the state during this period point to the likelihood that single-room schoolhouses predominated here also, as they were relatively easy and inexpensive to construct, and they tended to serve well the needs of the students and their teachers.

The New Home School Building remains a good and relatively intact example of this particular building type. Its simple, gable-roof form and single-room plan are typical of these traditional, country schoolhouses that were designed simply and functionally, without detail or ornamentation, for the sole purpose of providing a warm, dry environment for the teaching of

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the local students that typically walked to this building every school day. In spite of the addition of the later Craftsman-style porch, the New Home School Building remains the best example of this type in the Swifton vicinity, and is thus eligible under Criterion C.






