#### Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Lassise-Schettini Residence is a two-storey concrete and wood mansion with sheet-metal roofing located on the ourskirts, just north of the town of Sabana Grande. Ecclectic in essence, the house presents a hybrid of various stylistic influences flourishing in Puerto Rico during the 1920's: the traditional plantation house of the United States Gulf Coast and the Caribbean, the Chicago Prarie House, and the Moorish-Spanish revival.

In plan, the overall massing of the structure consists of a complex integration of various volumes around a central square unit in the form of a Louisiana plantation house, with a peripheral two-storey balcony. This main volume is capped by a smaller, square-shaped, and hip-roofed clerestory at the roof's apex.

Two smaller wings on the eastern corners of the house are also square in plan, overlapped by the main section of the house. Each of these sectiona is articulated in the same manner as the main square: two storeys, with a peripheral balcony and hipped, metal roofing. From the northwest corner springs a longer, one-storey, flat-roofed wing toward the west. This three-garage wing is articulated by a paired-pier rhythm and capped by a concrete baluster parapet, as an extension of the balustrade and terrace defining the peripheral balcony of the main volume.

A complex rhythm is created in the juxtaposition of the balcony's main, double-height square piers with one-storey piers on the ground level and paired columns on the second level. The paired columns surrounding the main volume are articulated with multi-colored arabesque mosaics at the capitals. The one-storey, ground-level piers each serve as a pedestal for an urn for plants, as is common in many of the houses of the Chicago Prarie School.

The interiors of the house exhibit influence upon Puerto Rican architecture more than other elements. A double-height square atrium in the center of the plan serves as a central "courtyard" with a sweeping stair at center, leading up to an interior peripheral balcony. At the upper balcony level, a series of double-doors opens out on all sides to major living spaces and bedrooms. The ceiling of this central atrium steps in and opens up into a smaller square "clerestory" through which light and air filter into the central space.

#### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Lassise-Schettini Residence, or La Quinta, as it is commonly referred to, was built in 1924 for **0** octor Enrique Lassise, a local physician and remembered good-samaritan of the town of Sabana Grande and his wife Matilde Schettini, a school teacher. The home was designed by Luis Perocier, a well-known architect of the early XX century. The house displays an ecclectic design consisting of various architectural influences prevalent in Puerto Rico at the time: the traditional architecture of the plantation houses of the Caribbean and the Louisiana **g**ulf Coast is seen in the overall massing and concept of the house; the influences of the European Arts and Crafts movement and the Prarie School are seen in the decorative interiors and the many terraces, and the Moorish-Spanish revival is apparent in the arabesque tile mosaics on the capitals of the exterior columns.

Luis Perocier, a major architect and contractor of the period in Puerto Rico designed many public buildings and residences for the aristocracy of western Puerto Rico. Among his most noted designs are: the José de Diego Building (NR-11-18-77) and the rehabilitation of the Asilo de Pobres de Mayaguez (NR-12-02-85).

Perocier's designs were particularly influenced by the architecture of Antonin Nechodoma, a Czech architect who studied with Frank Lloyd Wright under Louis Sullivan and later settled in Puerto Rico. Due to industrialization, urban renewal and expansion, most of Nechodoma's great houses have disappeared. Perocier's "La Quinta," although not as well-resolved as Nechodoma's works, remains as one of the few major examples of prarieinfluenced structures in Puerto Rico and the only intact manor house of its kind in Sabana Grande. In addition, it is Perocier's most ambitious design in the area, and the residence dominates the landscape of the town outskirts and commands a view of the whole town and region. In brief, "La Quinta" is both a visual and historical landmark of the region.
