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### **Description**

### Setting:

The Wrangle Gap Shelter is located within the Wrangle Gap Campground in the SE ½ of the NE ¼ of Section 31, Township 40 South, Range 1 West, W.M., in southern Jackson County. The shelter stands at 6,800' elevation on gently sloping ground on the north-facing slopes of the Siskiyou Mountain range, between Little Red Mountain and Red Mountain near the Rogue-Klamath Divide. The site is located near the source of Wrangle Creek, a tributary of Glade Creek, which in turn flows into the Little Applegate River. The shelter is reached by Forest Road 2300 leading approximately one-half mile north from Forest Road 20, commonly known as the Ashland Loop Road. Geology of the site is dominated by gneiss and other metamorphic rocks of the Dutchman Peak melange from the Paleozoic Era. Rock nearby, composed of the Applegate Group, is lightly glaciated. Within the site, the dominant vegetation is composed of Shasta red fir and white fir, mountain hemlock, and incense cedar. Shrub species include snowbrush, currant, and huckleberry, with an understory of grasses and hellebore.

### **Description**

Oriented with its main entrance to the east, the rustic-style wooden structure rests on a concrete foundation/floor. Shallow native rock steps lead to the front entry from the clearing. Rectangular in shape, the shelter measures approximately 18' x 26' in plan. Native rock walls that vary in height from two feet to six feet in height enclose the structure on the west, north, and south facades. The structure is fashioned by post-and-beam construction made from massive peeled logs and poles. Six-inch by twelve-inch hewn, wood sills rest atop the rock walls and vertical peeled log uprights. Vertical supports, 16" in diameter, extend from the center of the north and south elevations to brace the upper portion of the structure.

The shelter measures 16.5' from the inside of the peak of the roof to the top of the rock side wall on the north elevation. Supported by pole rafters with battered ends, the steeply pitched roof is composed of 12"- wide rough-cut planks covered by nailed sugar pine shakes. A massive native rock chimney that rises ten feet above the roof dominates the west elevation. Two window openings in the rear wall measure approximately 40" square and contain sills that measure 18" in width. On the interior, the mortared-rock fireplace and chimney is flanked on either side by iron fireboxes with doors bearing the Forest

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Service shield. The fireboxes measure 3' in length by 2.4' in width. A sink, positioned along the north railing, no longer functions.

The Wrangle Gap Shelter is in good condition with few modifications. During the last decade the vertical support posts were added on the exterior walls and a deteriorating horizontal beam was replaced (LaLande, 1999).

### **Significance**

The Wrangle Gap Shelter was constructed in 1935-1936 by Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) crews stationed at Camp Applegate F-41 on the Applegate Ranger District of the Rogue River National Forest. Also known as a "community kitchen," the shelter is generally typical of similar structures built on National Forest land. The structure is significant for its association with CCC recreation facility construction in southwestern Oregon. Submitted as part of a multiple property submission," U.S. Forest Service Historic Structures on the Rogue River National Forest, Oregon," the Wrangle Gap Shelter represents its historic context, "CCC/FERA Recreation Development on the Rogue River National Forest 1933 to 1942." The site meets the registration requirements outlined for recreational shelters in the registration document. Constructed in 1935-1936, it was established during the historic period. The shelter retains its integrity of setting, design, and materials, and it evokes direct historic associations with its historic context. The property is eligible to the National Register of Historic Places under Criterion A as a tangible example of the federal response to the crisis of the Great Depression and of CCC/FERA recreational development in southwest Oregon. The Wrangle Gap Shelter is the only intact feature built by the Civilian Conservation Corps remaining in the campground area. The shelter is one of five "community kitchen" shelters on the Rogue River National Forest. The others are at Union Creek, McKee Bridge, Fish Lake, and Dead Indian Soda Springs.

Additionally eligible to the National Register under Criterion C as an excellent representative of CCC/FERA-built recreational shelters on the Rogue National Forest, the Wrangle Gap Shelter embodies the characteristics of its type through its setting, design, and materials, and retains its integrity. In overall good condition, the shelter exemplifies the rustic-style facilities constructed by the CCC during the historic period.

### **History**

The Wrangle Gap "Community Kitchen" Shelter was erected in 1935-1936 by Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) crews from Camp Applegate F-41. The site was chosen for its proximity to the Beaver Creek-Mount Ashland Loop Road, completed by the CCC the same year. The route immediately became a popular summer sightseeing drive for tourists and local people (LaLande 1980: 96). Camp work plans indicate that

work on Wrangle Gap Campground and other sites along the "Loop Road" began in July 1935 and were completed by February 1, 1936 (Brown: Camp Work Plans, 1936). In the spring of 1936, Rogue River National Forest Supervisor Karl Janouch reported on the CCC's recent accomplishments in the mountains southwest of Ashland:

One of the most interesting projects in road construction is the completion of the so-called Ashland Mountain loop drive. This road extends from the city of Ashland to the mouth of Beaver Creek... giving one of the most picturesque mountain views that can be found anywhere in the state of Oregon...

...Recreational development has received special consideration in the work program to meet the fast-growing demands of the public who are turning to the forested areas of the pacific coast for summer outings and vacations. A total of 136 acres of public campgrounds have been cleared and improvements consisting of community shelters, individual camp stoves and tables and sanitation facilities have been installed... rustic design is emphasized in all the construction at these recreational areas" (Ashland Daily Tidings, April 16, 1936, 1:1, 4:3-4).

In 1949 Rogue River National Forest records described Wrangle Gap Campground asa campground that contained space for two trailers, three campstoves, tables, a community kitchen, two banquet tables, toilets, and piped spring water (Brown, n.p. 1949).

### **Boundary Description**

The Wrangle Gap shelter is located in the SE ¼ of the NE ¼ of Section 31, Township 40 South, Range 1 West, W.M., in southern Jackson County. The property is further identified on USGS map, Siskiyou Peak Quadrangle, 7.5 minute series, included with this nomination. For purposes of this National Register nomination, the boundary of the eligible property may be determined by measuring approximately 125 west from the southwest corner of the shelter. Using this point as the outer boundary, define a circle approximately 250 feet in diameter to include the Wrangle Gap Shelter and the deteriorated portion of one CCC-built camp stove, to include one acre, more or less.

### **Boundary Justification**

This boundary encompasses the Wrangle Gap Shelter and the immediate surrounding of the forest site that historically has been part of camp activities. The area within this approximate 250' diameter circle defines a discrete, identifiable location associated with the historic CCC activities that took place at the Wrangle Gap Shelter.
