DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Michael Schaeffer house occupies a lot near the corner of Chandler and Eighth streets, some five blocks southeast of the central business district. While the immediate neighborhood of the property remains denuded after a recent Urban Renewal project, revival of the historic Blackford's Grove district has begun just south of Chandler. Recent plans for reuse have brightened the future of this structure, now vacant and boarded for almost five years.

Number 118 East Chandler is an economical version of the Queen Anne and Eastlake popular with Evansville builders and clients near the end of the nineteenth century. Constructed of hard-burned red brick, the Schaeffer House is two stories tall and is surmounted by a black slate roof. Rough-hewn limestone bands demark watertable, sills, and lintels and decorate chimneys. Mouse-toothed and raised 'checkerboard' brick panels divide each story at window openings. A fragile-looking wooden porch features four slender columns supporting an intricate cast-iron balcony. All windows are single-pane, double sash.

The plan of the house is basically rectangular, the major rooms arranged four over four. Three gables, however, surmount bays projecting from the principal mass of the building. On the facade, a section extends in advance of the entrance on the right side. In this section, a pair of narrow windows flank a central window on the first and second floors (art glass -- now in storage -- filled the first floor transom). The front gable's tympanum contains a pair of shorter windows topped by an arched decorative brick panel. The other two gables project transversely above bays. The middle section of these side bays carries fireplaces and chimneys, both bearing recessed, corbelled brick panels. The roof's polygonal volumes reflect these various elaborations, and an attenuated Eastlake dormer rises above the entrance.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Michael Schaeffer House represents a fairly typical late-nineteenth century middle class dwelling made additionally significant because of the destruction of its historic environment. Built in 1894 to house a bank cashier and his family, the building is a foursquare version of the flashy Queen Anne found frequently in the Riverside or Washington Avenue Historic Districts. The builder has depended upon varied massing and a simple decorative program using patterned brick to achieve the eclectically ornamented, picturesque quality of the Queen Anne. Schaeffer himself was a virtually unknown burgher. City directory data indicate that he was a rising clerk in a local bank before his untimely demise at the age of thirty-seven.

If not for the bulldozing of the neighborhood surrounding this building, the Schaeffer House would be just one more pivotal building in the Washington Avenue District (National Register Eligible, June 1978).
