7. Description**Condition:** Good

Description: The Estufa is a round adobe structure with exposed vigas extending through the walls to the outside. It has a 45° stair landing (that has concrete over the original stairs) for access to the roof. This building is modeled after a Santo Domingo Pueblo Kiva. The Estufa was designed and built by Dr. George Tight and university students as a Fraternity meeting place. It is currently unoccupied. The building has a pear shape.

Statement of Significance, Criterion A & C: The Estufa is one of six buildings on the campus of the University of New Mexico included in this nomination. The Estufa is significant because it was the first structure in New Mexico, outside a pueblo, designed and built in the Spanish Pueblo Revival Style. Part of Dr. Tight's vision for UNM was to have a unified architectural style that resembled the pueblo architecture. The Estufa was modeled after a kiva at the Santo Domingo Pueblo. After the completion of the Estufa Dr. Tight had two campus buildings in the Pueblo Style. A Year earlier Hodgin Hall,

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originally a three story Romanesque building, was remodeled as Dr.Tight wished into a Spanish Pueblo Revival Style building.

Verbal boundary description and justification: On the lands of the University of New Mexico beginning at the SE corner of University Blvd. and Grand Ave.; proceed east 50 feet to Redondo Dr.; turn south proceed 100 feet; turn west for 50 feet to University Blvd.; turn north and proceed 100 feet to the point of origin (note: this verbal boundary description is not a legal filed description for the Estufa. All buildings on UNM campus are described as being "on the lands of the University of New Mexico" in the records at the Bernalillo County Courthouse. This description is the area around the building measured and described for the Historic Register generally using a landmark as a beginning and ending point for easier reference).
