

Physical Description

This two-story American Foursquare house is situated on a level lot and surrounded by huge shade trees. Raised on a foundation of rusticated cast stone, the house, faced with weatherboards, is crowned by a high pyramid roof with overhanging eaves lined with exposed rafters. The large curving wrap-around porch features paired Tuscan columns supporting a full entablature enriched with modillion blocks at the base of the cornice. The porch balustrade has urn-shaped balusters. A distinguishing feature of this house is the central dormer capped with a curved Flemish gable roof outlined with molding. Three small sash windows appear in this dormer. As in several houses of this period, the wide plate glass living room window features an upper sash of leaded cames. The door has beveled plate glass and a simple transom. The larger sash windows have eight-over-one lights while the smaller windows have one-over-one.

Statement of Significance

The Davis House in Clarksville, Arkansas was designed by Charles L. Thompson ca. 1915. Located in the western area of the state, Clarksville is a small city on the edge of the Ozark National Forest. The picturesqueness of the town adds to the visual impact of the Davis House. A small-town older residential neighborhood which features large shade trees and multitudes of flowering shrubbery is the setting for the Davis House. Again Thompson uses the Foursquare design, but with two variations not usually seen: (1) Flemish gable in the dormer, and (2) paired Tuscan columns on the porch. With only minor alterations from the original design, the Davis House is an important historic structure in this rural Arkansas city.
