The original Oliver Theater was a fine neoclassic three story brick masonry structure built in 1876. The main facade (West side) had a series of alternate windows and doors in the first floor. Seven tall windows on the second level were encased in segmental arches. The third floor included seven additional windows, this time enclosed in semicircular arches, and located directly above the second level ones. Eight pilasters divided the facade in seven bays, with cornices defining each floor level. A triangular pediment completed the composition, reflecting the pitched metal roof of the theater. The interior was also outstanding with two levels of balconies and a fine stage.

In 1919 it was remodelled, after a series of earthquakes damaged the structure. The main alterations consist of changes to the main facade's second and third levels and the pediment. The second and third floor arches were pleased by six small rectangular windows. A stepped pediment with amphorae and plaster decorations complete the simple facade. The interior was provided with a main floor that raised mechanically to meet the stage. In this area sport activities and popular dances took place.

During the 1930's the theater was remodelled again, but this time the interior underwent the major changes. The mechanism that raised the floor was removed, the stage was shortened, and the balconies were boarded and replaced by a new mezzanine. In 1955 a cinemascope screen was installed and became exclusively a movie house until 1984 when it was closed. The billboard, new entrance and sign on the Southwestern corner were also added in the 1950's. Reinforced concrete, glass blocks, plastic laminates, etc., were employed throughout.

At present, the building retains the 1919 main facde's decoration and the 1930's interiors, although deteriorated. Remains of the original 1876 theater are evident in the South and the North facades (the latter concealed by a new building), and in the first floor of the West side. The cornices and pilasters of the main facade, some interior walls and details were also derived from the original theater.

#### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Teatro Oliver was Arecibo's first structure built for specific use as theater. Prior to its construction in 1876 by a great patron of the arts, the Marquéz "de las Claras"; theatrical performances were held in private clubs or houses.

The original neoclassic structure had a stagewhere great internatiional artists displayed their talents. Some of these great artists include actress Adelina Patts, opera singers Caruso and Antonio Paoli and during the 1930's Carlos Gardel, the great tango idol, gave one of his last performances on this stage, before his tragic death. Local actors also displayed their talent on this stage.These performances allowed people from all social echelons to expand their cultural horizon.

The Theater gave local playwrighters an opportunity to stage their work. Thanks to this, Arecibo bacame one of the island's cities to produce great playwrighters such as René Marquéz, considered as one of Puerto Rico's greatest talents in this artistic labor.

This was a true theater in the old European sense. Its facilities were used not only for theatrical presentation but also for social, sporting, political and other town events. Great public balls, exuberant carnivals and basketball games were held in Theaters' Orchestra level which thanks to a hidraulic system could be elevated to stagelevel thus making it a great ball room or sport arena. Politicians used the stage for their debates during campaign and schools used it for their graduations.

The theater was the city's center of life until recent years when it was closed due to its deteriorated conditions.

In the past two years the people of Arecibo have united and formed a commitee for the restoration of the Old Oliver Theater. At present, the municipal government is in the process of buying the property and the people are gathering funds to restore their beloved theater to its original nineteenth century splendor.


