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DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Hancock House is typical of many that were built in Salem County during the eighteenth century. It was built in 1728 and enlarged in 1734 by William and Sarah Hancock.

The house was built on a large parcel of land that extended on both sides of Lower Alloway Creek adjacent to a bridge that had been built in 1708. Tidal water and salt marsh extended to the bridge. The bridge was within 100 yards of the house and lead to Salem six miles away.

The building is brick on a stone foundation with the gable oriented in and east west direction. The brick is a Flemish bond pattern with glazed headers. The western end is laid up in a zig-zag pattern from ground level to the attic floor line. Above this point there are the initials H.W.S. and the date 1734. These are made with glazed bricks.

The windows are of the sash type, 16 over 16 and are placed symetrically across the front and rear of the 1734 section. The windows and door are placed proportionally across the front and side of the house. Small windows, four lights, each were placed in the rear of the closets along the gable ends.

There are two rooms on each floor of the 173h sections and three rooms and loft in the 1728 section. All the rooms have fireplaces. Dormers on each of the sections are different but original. The fireplaces, molding, floors and paneling are original.

The only significant difference in the physical appearance of the building is the encroachment of a highway and twentieth century structures. There are still $2\frac{1}{2}$ acres of land around the property.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Hancock House is significant for a massacre during the American Revolution and for its architecture. The attack was in reprisal for the fact that the citizens of Hancock's Bridge sent 300 head of cattle to Washington's army at Valley Forge, Pa., during the bitter winter of 1777-1778.

During the Revolution Thirty men were stationed in the house in order to guard the bridge and to aid foraging parties through the area. On March 21, 1778 Major* Simcoe with approximately 300 British soldiers, mercenaries and fellow travelers, attacked the house, killing the sentries. They then charged the house forcing the men to the attic where they were bayonetted to death.

Architecturally the brickwork is typical of many early houses in the Salem area. Blue-glazed headers and stretchers were used to create patterns in the brick which often included geometric designs and the initials of the owners. Only a few of these houses remain. The Hancock House is the only one that is state-owned.
