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#### Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

#### Description

Dove Creek Baptist Church, constructed around 1880, is a one-story, wood-framed vernacular building with a front-gabled roof. It is located in a wooded rural setting on the south side of State Highway 72 about 5 miles west of Elberton. It was moved from a similar rural site one-fourth mile southeast of the present site in 1979, as a result of problems caused by vandalism and access. The church rests on a new concrete block foundation and has new wood steps at the front entrance. The double entrance door has a simple roof canopy. Other exterior architectural features include four-over-four double hung sash windows, fish-scale siding, and a louvered window on the front gable of the main facade, and a rear three sided addition that was added around 1952. The interior of the church has its original wainscoting, windows, and pews. The original tongue-and-groove ceiling, and flooring are intact underneath the existing materials.

The church is sited in a cleared, level area with a forest of pine trees to the rear. A Sunday School Annex about 50 feet adjacent to the church is under construction.

#### Boundary

Because this building has been moved, because its significance rests largely with its architectural features and historical associations to the building itself, and because the setting of the building, although similar to its original setting, is relatively undifferentiated in terms of topography and landscaping, the nominated property in this case consists of the building itself and just the land upon which the building sits.

#### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

#### Significance

Dove Creek Baptist Church is significant in the areas of architecture, black history, and religion.

In terms of <u>architecture</u>, the property is important as one of few remaining examples of small rural black churches built in the late 19th century in northeast Georgia. Founded by a small group of rural blacks who wanted their own church after the Civil War, Dove Creek Baptist Church is similar to other late 19th century rural black churches in Georgia in its simple frame construction and rectangular shape with gabled roof and little architectural detailing. Other characteristic features are the central entrance, rear extension, and weatherboard siding. Although the building was moved, it retains its overall structural integrity. In addition its new rural setting, which is only one-fourth mile to the northwest from its original location is virtually identical to its original setting and share the same relationship to the nearby Hamlet of Dove Creek. Because of its architectural characteristics, the property meets National Register Criteria C.

Dove Creek Baptist Church is significant in the areas of black history and religion for its association with a small black congregation, many members of which were former slaves and sharecroppers, who withdrew from the predominantly white Dove Creek Church after the Civil War to organize their own church. The original church land was donated by Mr. Al Oliver (1816 - 1882), a white landowner and former slaveowner in Elbert County. This small rural church is representative of the independent black religious community that withdrew from the older white church following emancipation, a practice that was common in Georgia and throughout the south in the latter part of the 19th century. The congregation consisted of about 50 to 75 members in the late 19th and early 20th centuries, and it is still active today with about 75 to 100 members.

#### Context

In 1984, Carole Merritt authored a study for the Georgia State Historic Preservation Office entitled Historic Black Resources. This publication documented, in general terms, the history and development of African-American resources in Georgia. Prominent among the important property types identified in this handbook is the late 19th-century rural church. In every respect, the Dove Creek Church fits the model of this important property type.


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National Register Criteria

Because it represents an important historic property type, with its characteristic features, the Dove Creek Baptist Church meets National Register Criteria "C". Because of its associations with the growth of free black congregations in rural areas of Georgia after the Civil War, it meets National Register Criteria "A". The historical and architectural significance of this church satisfies the requirement of Criteria Consideration "A" pertaining to religious properties. Because of its significance as a historic building and the only "public" historic structure associated with the postbellum rural black community of Dove Creek, and because the building was moved only a short distance to a compatible location, it satisfies the requirement of Criteria Consideration "B" pertaining to moved structures.
