DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This nomination is for two commercial blocks, erected almost simultaneously and sharing a common entrance and staircase. The larger of the two is the Opera House Block, originally owned by E.E. Warren. The smaller, exclusively commercial block on the south was owned by John J. He therington, whose name appears on the lintel above a second story window. Both buildings are 2½ stories on full basements, of solid brick construction, and they share a common architectural style. Large plate-glass windows and recessed entrances (now modernized, but similar to the original) characterize the ground floor. Above this level, the facades each have a tripartite arrangement with very slightly projecting center frontispieces. A broad beltcourse of rock-faced stone runs along the tops of the second story In the area between the beltcourse and the narrow metal cornice is a series of lunette overpanels, placed like "caps" above the center windows of the frontispieces and on the flanking sindows of the opera house portion of the facade. Flanking the overpanel on the opera house frontispiece are small square windows with their own stone lintels. On the Hetherington block, this motif is executed as a blind square panel outlined with a decorative terracotta molding. Small caps with finials are spaced along the top of the brick parapet to denote the outer edges of the Opera House block and its frontispiece, which is topped with a triangular pediment below which are the words "opera house"in stone letters. The frontispiece of the Hetherington block ends in a similar feature, but here it takes the form of a simple stone triangle on a brick base.

The north elevation is very simple, with round-arched windows irregularly placed. A metal stairway to the second story has been removed.

The most prominent feature of the building is the corner turret, faced with pressed matal which has decorative spandrels, blind oculi, and a copper "dome" with finial.

The ground floors of both buildings are used as retail space. The main store area of the opera house block is $80' \times 44'$, with a smaller store area, oriented toward the north, at the rear, measuring $22' \times 44'$. The auditorium area on the second floor is $82' \times 44'$. The west 20 feet (on the front) of the second floor was originally built as four rooms, which could be used either as an office suite or as four individual offices. The stage has been removed, and the second floor is vacant.

The Greenfield Community Service Club is planning to purchase the Opera House block, and restore the auditorium for community use. A restaurant is planned for the second floor of the He therington Block.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Warren Opera House and He therington Blocks, which together form a discrete unit on the east side of Greenfield's courthouse square, stand as well-preserved examples of Iowa's small-town opera house and commercial architecture from the late 19th century. The interior arrangement of the opera house block, featuring both entertainment and commercial space, was a characteristic typical of the state's small-town opera houses, and a prudent one, since the population of the community would not be sufficient to adequately support a theater alone. The opera house is prominently sited, and the turret is a typical feature of corner-lot commercial architecture influenced by the late 19th century revival of Romanesque forms. The He therington block is an appropriate companion piece, repeating the basic architectural elements of the opera house, but varying sufficiently in treatment of detail to be noticeable as a separate structure.

The contract was let for both buildings in May, 1896, to B.F. Garmer of Greenfield, who worked from plans by C.E. Bell and F. Kent of Council Bluffs. Warren's dry goods store opened at its new location on December 1 of that year. The Chase-Lister theatrical company's "Caprice" opened the opera house, to poor reviews, on December 14.

E.E. Warren was born in New London, Henry County, Iowa, in 1862. He came to Greenfield in 1879, after several years' clerking in local general stores in New London. For 2½ years Warren was employed at Greenfield's A.P. Stephens and Co., and then for two more years at Stephens' branch in Creston. In 1883, Warren went into partnership with Stephens, and the firm's name was changed to Fuller, Warren and Co. In 1886, Warren bought out his partners, brought his brother F.C. into the firm, and renamed it yet again "Warren Bros.". Warren took sole ownership in 1889, and operated the business until 1910. That year, he went west, apparently to oversee his agricultural holdings in the Dakotas. He returned to Greenfield and reopened his dry goods store, which he operated until his death.
