Faith Chapel, from 1904 to 1942, provided religious services for the community of millionaires who wintered at the exclusive Jekyll Island Club. Services at the non-denominational church were conducted by Bishops Poller, Doane, Nelson, Reese and Dr. Schauffer; the choir was composed of Club waiters. Recorded in the Register are burials for two seamen, drowned March 21, 1912. Their graves, in the old Horton-duBignon Cemetery, were marked by members of the Church.

Until 1970 the church also served the later residents of Jekyll Island. At that time restoration and repairs were begun by the Jekyll Island State Park Authority. Faith Chapel is now open to the public. The Chapel's major architectural features are original stained-glass windows by Maitland Armstrong and Louis Comfort Tiffany set in a quiet and distinguished example of what might be called Shingle Style Gothic Revival.


