Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Charles L. Cushman House of Auburn, designed by Lewiston architect George M. Coombs and built in 1889, is an elaborate Queen Anne style mansion of stone.

The house is of field-stone construction with wooden and cut granite trim. Two stone chimneys are present, slightly projecting from the south-east and southwest walls. The roof is of cross-gabled form and there is a circular tower at the east corner. The building contains $2\frac{1}{2}$ stories above a full basement. Fenestration is generally 1/1, typical of the period and style.

The facade faces north-east and features the corner tower to the left. This is of 2 stories with a conical slated roof. The entrance is covered by a one-story porch with large arched bays and a porte-cochere of equivalent detail. An interesting feature is two sets of granite steps leading from the carriage-way: immediately beside a narrow flight of steps is a raised set which allowed convenience for those alighting from carriages. The second story of the facade consists of a wooden gable-end which contains an arched window surrounded by elaborate wooden carvings.

The south-east side of the house contains an arched window in the first story, a rectangular one in the second, and a pair of rectangular ones in the half-story; the wooden half-story contains a balcony in a recess which almost fully exposes the stone chimney. Here as well there are elaborate wooden carvings in a floral motif.

The other two sides of the house carry far simpler detail.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Charles L. Cushman House is significant as an unusual architectural specimen in the Queen Anne style and certainly one of the finest residential designs of George M. Coombs, Auburn's prolific and leading late 19th century architect. The house is also important as a reflection of the affluence derived from shoe manufacturing, the city's most important industry in the period.

Beautifully sited on a bluff overlooking the city, this massive pile of field stone with its ornamented gables, circular corner tower and elaborate porch and porte-cochere, was built in 1889 by Charles L. Cushman, son of Ara Cushman, founder of **one of the largest** shoe manufacturing complexes in New England. At the time the house was built Charles was vice president and general superintendent of the manufacturing department of the Ara Cushman Company which consisted of three factories with 118,500 square feet of space and over 1,000 employees. All of this had sprung from a small three man operation in nearby Minot begun by his father in 1854.

Beside the great stone house the estate consisted of a large greenhouse, stables and a tennis court on several acres of land. Now, only the house remains on a reduced but still ample plot.

George M. Coombs (1852-1909) was the leading architect in the Lewiston-Auburn area for many years and participated in the design of the majority of the public and industrial buildings of the period in both cities. He also executed a large number of residential commissions for many of the impressive late 19th century houses for which the region is noted. Outstanding among these is certainly the Cushman House which received national attention after selection for publication in the <u>American Architect and Building News</u> of December 21, 1889.
