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STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE (Include Personages, Dates, Events, Etc.)

This ante-bellum middle-class farm of 168 acres is important because it represents a typical farm of the period. Many other antebellum homes of finer architectural features exist now but few of the middle-class group remain in fact as does this farm. It is also significant because Sam Davis had lived there before he went away to military school and then to the war which led to his hanging as a spy in 1863.

Sam Davis, a member of Coleman's Scouts, was captured by Union troops in November, 1863. Under his saddle and in his boot were papers containing information on the fortifications, numbers, and movements of federal troop units. He was convicted as a spy by a military court and was hanged at Pulaski, Tennessee, after refusing a pardon which had been promised if he would betray his informer. After his execution the young private was carried back to Smyrna to be buried on December 24, 1863, in his family burial ground.

The home of Sam Davis was bought by the State of Tennessee from Davis descendants in 1927 to preserve as a shrine to the "Boy Hero." In 1930 the Sam Davis Memorial Association was organized to restore the house as a shrine. Many of the original furnishings and belongings are preserved today in the house. A bronze statue stands on the grounds of the State house in Nashville to honor his heroic deeds.
