

Description

The New Market Hotel and Store, now Shea's Hardware, is located on the north side of Main Street in the village of New Market in the southeastern part of Scott County. It is located in the town's very small business district at the west end of a row of adjoining commercial buildings.

The 1897 commercial block measures approximately twenty-six feet by seventy feet. It is two stories in height and is constructed of red brick decorated with contrasting yellow brick. The street facade consists of a three bay storefront on the east and a single door on the west which provides access to the second floor. The storefront is mostly original. The brick on the first floor street facade has been painted white. The four second-story windows are slightly arched and double hung with two over two lights. The windows have stone sills and window caps in relief of yellow brick. Yellow brick pilasters are located at the corners of the building and also between the bays of the storefront. The top of the building is decorated with a cornice of polychrome relief brickwork and a central semi-circular projection.

The first floor now houses a hardware store and the owner's living area at the rear. The second floor, once the hotel, is now being used for storage. The building is well preserved and retains its nineteenth century design integrity.

### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The New Market Hotel and Store is significant both as a well preserved example of the commercial blocks that were constructed during the late nineteenth century along the major streets of Scott County towns and as New Market's only nineteenth century commercial block. It was built in 1897 by Joseph Baltes, one of the founders of the village of New Market, to house a small hotel and general store. New Market was the principal town in southeastern Scott County, serving a strictly agricultural area. The town was settled during the 1850s as a small Catholic hamlet and grew to be the area's major center. A railroad line never reached New Market, and the town was never able to compete with the larger population centers in the northern and western parts of the county. As a result the community retains its historic identity as a small town serving an agricultural community. Baltes' store and hotel has been an important element on the business streetscape since the time it was built and is worthy of recognition and preservation.
