DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Floral Hall is an octagonal building supporting a large matching cupola. It is located in a grove of trees in the southeastern portion of the Ceder County Fairgrounds.

Each side of the building measures thirty feet in width. There is a large sliding door opening to each of the four main directions. The unfinished painted interior is spacious, broken only by supporting members which make it well adapted for use as a floral display area -- hence its official designation as "Floral Hall".

The frame building has drop siding, asphalt shingled roof, and an absence of windows in the main structure. Lighting is obtained through the cupola, which is comprised principally of windows, except for necessary supporting corners. Electric lights now make the hall usable at night.

The materials and system of construction used for the large single interior space bear explanation. The post pattern is octagonal, paralleling the perimeter of the structure. Eight 6 x 6 posts extend through the wooden floor to footings. These eight posts rise to the junction of the roof and the cupola walls. At this point the posts are capped by a double plate of 2 x 6, and then eight 4 x 6 posts rise on top of this plate to form the outside corners of the cupola itself. These 4 x 6 posts are in turn capped by a pair of 2 x 6's to form the top plate of the cupola .

The main posts are all spanned by double 2 x 6 plates. The first double plate carries the top of the rafters of the main floor. The second carries the bottom of the cupola rafters.

The bracing is extensive. Near the top of the cupola walls are four 4 x 6 members criss-crossed in a manner so that all eight 4 x 6 posts are secured together. Off of the main floor at a twelve-foot level there is a horizontal band of 2 x 6 members connecting the eight posts. At this same level on the outside of the inner posts, 6 x 6 beams extend to the posts on the outer perimeter. On each of these 6 x 6beams is set a 6 x 6 post approximately 5½ feet high to intersect with the 6 x 6 hips. At this junction there is also a 4 x 6 purlin that carries not only the commons but some of the jack rafters. Midway on the 6 x 6 - - $5\frac{1}{2}$ foot posts are let-in 4 x 6 knee-braces out to the purlins. Each short post has a pair of knees. At the top of the short 6 x 6 post angling downward toward the center of the building is a 6 x 6 brace, the lower end of which seats on top of the long horizontal 6 x 6 beam. In addition, there is a single 4 x 4 knee-brace from the underside of the horizontal 6 x 6 beam attached to the main vertical 6 x 6 posts. On the outer end of the 6 x 6 beam, a pair of 2 x 6's as knees extend down to each corner timber of the exterior sides.

Situated on its original site, its continued use is contemplated and the owners are in the process of obtaining bids for some necessary repairs.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Floral Hall is unique due to its octagonal architecture. The few other buildings of this shape in our area were constructed roughly between 1860 and 1880, but this one was not erected until 1899.

An original floral hall was dismantled to permit erection on the same site of this 1899 building. Few clues indicate the shape of the building torn down. There is some indication that it too may have been octagonal, while another account suggests it was the shape of a cross.

With a perimeter of 240 feet, it covers considerably more area than its predecessor. The building was designed as a floral hall and that has been its principal use through the years. Its ownership has remained continuously in the hands of the Ceder County Fair Association.

The directors of the Tipton Fair Association in 1899 appointed H L Dean superintendent of construction. He was a conscientious man and performed his duties well. The cost was to be approximately \$1,000. After the building was under construction it was decided to add a hard-pine floor. This added \$250 to the cost of the building.
