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18. up. The roof extends over the porch. Its wide eaves feature large, carved brackets grouped in threes. Piercing the roof is an unusual pair of linked, gabled dormers. Each dormer has a group of three, sash windows set in a segmental arch and a bracketed cornice. The gable ends on the east and west sides of the structure have stuccoed finishes and decorative wood framing.

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
