Both the chapel and the manse were built in 1870-71. They are both very clean and straight forward; of good design for their day. The front wing of the chapel is the original - the long portion at the rear was added in 1919. The chapel is of cruciform plan with a simple well proportioned belfry tower which gives emphasis to the entrance. The chapel is of frame and clapboard construction with a single tier of windows. It has four brick chimneys which served as early heating units, but now it has a bottled gas heating system.

The manse is two stories in height; also of wood frame construction. The upper story has shingle siding while the lower is of clapboard, like the chapel. The manse still boasts two chalk stone chimneys although their utilitary functions have been replaced by a gas heating unit. It has a gable roof and double hung windows. The manse has not been greatly altered since it was built, except for installation of hot water heating, and a makeshift bathroom. One of its most interesting relics is the the cooking stove said to have come from New York State three or four years after the manse was built. It now stands in one of the side rooms at the chapel and is still in good condition.

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The manse needs painting, and the chapel needs minor interior repairs by a carpenter. Other than these exceptions both are sound physical representations of original design with their basic integrity intact.

	Reverand and Mrs. Riggs came to the Santee Reservation in June of 1870. Mr. Riggs, a most prominent and well-known missionary, had wor with the Santee Sioux beginning in 1837 in their native Minnesota lan Mr. Riggs was well known throughout the Sioux nation as Zitkadanwaste (Goodbird). The Pilgrim Congregational Chapel was constructed shortly after Mr. Riggs' arrival. It served as both a chapel and a training school
	for Foreign Missions, for the training and teaching of the Sioux.
