Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Jackson-Johns House is a large two-and-one-half-story brick house with late-Victorian and Neoclassical detailing. The house is basically square in plan with a projecting bay at the front west corner and a two-story brick and wood-framed extension that stretches along the building's rear. It has three interior chimneys and a complex truncated hipped roof with a central dormer and pedimented-gable projection on each side. Pressed metal covers the roof, the gable ends, and the dormers. The front facade has a prominent two-story portico classically detailed with Corinthian columns and an ornate entablature. In addition, a second-story balcony extends from the projecting bay to the front east corner where it is supported by a small first-floor porch that runs along the southeast side of the house. Doors and one-over-one double-hung sash windows have stone sills and are set in segmental arched openings. A prominent denticulated cornice that wraps around the house completes the detailing. Few alterations have been made to the house. Recently, the badly-decaying two-story porch on the rear (probably originally open, but filled-in at some unknown date) was replaced with a similar enclosed structure.

The interior of the Jackson-Johns House has a somewhat irregular plan. A central hall on the first floor is flanked by four main rooms with smaller rooms including a bath, rear hall, and pantry located at the rear. The original kitchen was located in the brick portion of the rear extension. The front west room was originally a doctor's office with a door leading directly to the front porch. At an early date this door was replaced by the present window. Upstairs are six rooms opening off a central hall. A stairway in the central hall leads to an attic finished on the walls and ceiling with tongue-and-groove boards. The rooms have hardwood floors and plaster walls finished with baseboards and picture rails. Ceilings were originally beaded tongue-and-groove, but some have been covered with acoustic tile. Interior detailing includes doors with transoms and windows trimmed with molding with bull's-eye corner blocks. First and second floor stairways have turned balusters and large, ornate newel posts. There are sliding doors between the dining room and parlor, a built-in china cabinet in the dining room, and a decorative screen dropped from the ceiling in the downstairs stairhall. Mantels with classical detailing, many with mirrored overmantels, are located in nearly every room. Some of the original plumbing fixtures remain in place.

The Jackson-Johns House is located in an area close to Winder's historic downtown. It was originally residential but has become increasing commercial. A large late-Victorian house is still located next door. The house sits on a large level lot informally planted with shade and flowering trees, foundation shrubbery, grass, and flowers. A broad walk leads from the sidewalk to the front entrance, and a driveway leads from Candler Street to a parking area in the rear. The house has recently been renovated to serve as offices for a local bank.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

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The Jackson-Johns House is a large Neoclassical house in Winder which has been associated with a number of individuals who made important contributions to the town. It is historically significant in terms of architecture and local history and meets National Register Criteria A, B, and C.

Architecture

المحاورية المترجر الحار الجنور والمحاد المحاد المحاد المحاد The Jackson-Johns House is an interesting example of a small-town interpretation of the Neoclassical style and provides an important example of that style in Winder. Built in 1903 by Hillman Jackson who was, among other things, a builder, it is somewhat transitional in style with late-Victorian as well as Neoclassical features. It illustrates how high-style houses were interpreted by local builders in small Georgia towns. The prominent classically detailed portico, the denticulated cornice that extends around the house, the rooftop dormers and pedimented gables, and the mantels give the impression of a Neoclassical house. However, upon close examination the house also reveals many late-Victorian features. The unpainted red brick is in itself Victorian -- a true Neoclassical house would almost certainly have been painted white. The segmental-arched window and door openings, the asymmetrical projecting corner bay, and the asymmetrical roof are all features that relate more to Victorian than Neoclassical houses. Originally built as a doctor's home and office, the house no doubt reflects an attempt to mesh form and function. The doctor's office, located on the first floor of the projecting bay, was entered directly from the front porch, thus setting it apart from the doctor's home. The house documents building materials and technology typically found in small-town Georgia houses of this period.

Local History

In terms of local history, the Jackson-Johns House is significant for its associations with several of Winder's prominent citizens and for its successive use as a doctor's home and office, a hotel, and a private residence. The house was built by Hillman Jackson, a local businessman, landowner, builder, and one-time mayor, for his friend, Dr. Charles Almond, who lived in the house and practiced medicine there from 1904 to 1910. Dr. Almond was a highly respected local physician who, along with several partners, founded the Winder Drug Company. Following the Almond family tenure in the house it was operated from 1912-1913 as the Colonial Hotel by Hillman Jackson's son, Walter Jackson. In 1918, Jackson's daughter Sunnie and her husband George A. Johns purchased the house from her father and made it their residence. Johns was a prominent lawyer and politician who served as Barrow County representative to the Georgia Legislature, State Senator for the 27th Senatorial District, Winder City Attorney, Barrow County Attorney, and Judge for the City of Winder. The house remained in the Johns family until 1983. 4 1 6 4 GA

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

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
