Historically, the house is associated with Jasper Armstrong, the original	
builder. Armstrong ran a country store across the road from the house that	
served the local community. Around the turn of the century he purchased 80 acres east of this property which was crossed by the route of the Gulf	
and Ship Island Railroad. Armstrong planned a town, laid out lots, and became the founder of the town of Arm.
