Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

SUMMARY

Exhibiting the influence of both the Queen Anne and Classical Revival styles, the Lewis Brothers Hardware Building is sited on the northwest corner of the Fayetteville Square. The three-story building, constructed in 1904, is composed of red brick sharply contrasted against an abundance of limestone trim. East and north facades culminate at the corner in a recessed corner entrance dramatically topped with a tower. These elements, combined with a detailed cornice and stepped roofline, distinguish the Lewis Brothers Hardware Building as one of the most attractive and architecturally significant commercial buildings in Washington County.

ELABORATION

The Lewis Brothers Hardware Building was begun in 1904 and occupies a sloped corner lot on the northwest area of the town square in Fayetteville, Washington County. The building rests on a regular course ashlar stone foundation. Constructed of red brick and adorned with prominent limestone trim, the building has two facades with the narrow side facing the square and Block Street and the longer facade facing Center Street on the north.

The intersection of these two elevations is marked by a bold round tower under which is the recessed main entrance. A double-leaf door surmounted by a transom is placed at an angle across the corner and flanked by wide sidelights utilized as showcase space. Fixed sash windows are located above the entrance transom and wide sidelights.


Large showcase windows flank the corner entryway; one on the east facade and two on the north. Five pilasters composed of alternating brick and limestone bands with large limestone bases flank showcase windows and support cast iron beams which in turn support the corner tower. An unfluted cast iron column with a delicate Corinthian capital supports the steel beams at their intersection. The beams are embellished with rosettes above the column and the corners of each pilaster.

The cornice is marked by corbelled brick with dentils and the roof is encircled by a tall regularly stepped parapet surmounted with limestone coping. The tower and east facade possess two limestone bands; one directly below the architrave and the other between the first and second floors. On the east facade a three-sided bay window with one-over-one, double-hung sashes is topped with a wide lintel and pediment. A small window without a transom placed between the bay and tower emphasize the dominance of both. The tower, lined with three evenly-place one-over-one double-hung sash windows and capped with limestone lintels, is encircled by a wide wood cornice detailed with large modillions. The tower was once crowned with a conical roof, but due to damage caused by leakage, the tower was removed.

The north facade is lined with windows on first and second stories; six evenly-spaced four-paned casement windows with limestone sills and lintels on the first floor and evenly-spaced single and paired one-over-one double-hung sash windows capped with transoms on the second floor. A band of limestone placed below each lintel connects each window. The band is broken near the northwest corner by paired two-over-six, double-hung sash windows topped with a simple pediment on the first floor. On the second floor the center of the north facade has a large bricked section which once contained a sloped studio window while the back of the facade possesses a bay window

like the window at the front. The rear elevation faces west and is spanned by brick arches over windows on the second floor and service entries on the first floor.

The interior's main floor features a pressed metal ceiling over primarily open space. The basement is accessible by a stairway in the front quadrant of the floor and a second is centered along the north wall. Basement space was utilized as display area and is undivided. During the past years the second floor served a variety of functions and is divided by temporary partitions. A small mezzanine separates the two main floors at the west end of the building.

Restoration plans to convert the building for use as a bank include replacing windows previously bricked in and re-construction of the conical roof above the tower.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

SUMMARY

The Lewis Brothers Hardware Building has been a hallmark of the Fayetteville Square since its completion in 1908. Its distinctive red-brick-and-white-limestone presence dominates the northwest corner of the Square, and its exterior styling has influenced the design of structures throughout the downtown area, most notably the Old Post Office Building (NR 08/27/74) which stands in the center of the square.

ELABORATION

The Lewis brothers partnership began in 1897, when the family opened a hardware store with W. T. Farrar. With the move to the present location in 1908, the Lewis brothers began a history of influence in the Fayetteville community which continues to the present day. The hardware store, which eventually expanded to include housewares and furniture, provided an unofficial community hub during the early 1900's, and the building came to symbolize a tradition of service and fairness. The Lewis family sold the business in 1957, but retained ownership of the building and leased it to the new proprietors, the Walden family of Campbell-Bell, Inc. The Lewis Brothers name remained, however, and the store continued operation until early 1986. Use of the building then reverted to the Lewises.

Plans to restore most of the structure's original features are being implemented. The Lewis Brothers Hardware Building will continue to serve a significant place in Fayetteville's commercial community as the location of a locally-owned full-service bank, recently incorporated by the Lewis family.

Lewis Brothers Building

While this nomination contains many indications of the significance of the Lewis Brothers Building, more attention must be devoted to developing a larger context within which this property can be thoroughly understood. If the exterior styling of the Lewis Brothers Building has indeed influenced the design of the post office and other downtown Fayetteville buildings, what evidence of this influence is visible? Please provide some specifics regarding what downtown buildings were influenced by the design of the Lewis Brothers Building and also explain how these influences are manifested.

With regard to commercial significance, the nomination focuses on outlining the longevity of the hardware business started by the Lewis Brothers. The durability of the business is no doubt an indication of its commercial significance, but more detailed elaboration is required in order to clearly establish commercial significance. More specifically, the nomination should directly consider the distinguishing characteristics which differentiate this hardware business from other successful businesses in the community. Doing this will allow for the creation of a broader context and thereby help to establish the commercial significance of the particular business associated with the building being nominated.

Furthermore, some effort should be made to integrate the summary and elaboration portions of the nomination's significance section. The summary deals only with the building's architectural significance, while the elaboration revolves around the issue of commercial significance. The summary should attempt to introduce both of these aspects of significance, while the elaboration should further substantiate each area of significance.

Finally, some consideration should be given to revising the specific dates associated with the period of significance. The present specific date range is 1904-1908, although the hardware business founded by the Lewis Brothers did not occupy this building until 1908. This date range, which reflects the time period during which the Lewis Brothers Building was being constructed, would be adequate if the building was being nominated only on the basis of architectural significance. However, if commercial significance is to be established, the specific date range must somehow reflect the period during which the building was commercially significant.

Reviewer's Comments:

The revised version of the Lewis Brothers Building nomination offers clear evidence of improvement. The resubmission contains additional information about the influential nature of the building's design and the organization of the summary and elaboration sections has been enhanced. Despite these positive signs, several lingering problems must be rectified before the Lewis Brothers Building can be listed in the National Register.

Perhaps the most important problem involves the specific dates listed under the period of significance. Although the specific dates have been revised, these dates still do not clearly reflect the commercial significance of the property. While 1908 is undoubtedly an appropriate date given that construction of the building was completed during that year, what is the significance of 1947? The text should provide documentation which explains the rationale for concluding the historical period in 1947. In addition, if the period of significance is to be extended until 1947, then the Lewis Brothers Building will have to be demonstrated to be exceptionally significant as a less-than-fifty-year-old property.

Furthermore, the discussion of commercial significance remains unclear. It is difficult to determine whether the claim for commercial significance is based on the historical importance of the hardware store under criterion A or on the property's association with members of the Lewis family under criterion B. Please determine whether the case for the building's significance rests upon the importance of the hardware business which was once located there or whether the building's association with the Lewis family is the primary consideration. If the hardware business is emphasized, please indicate what factors made the hardware busines more noteworthy than other local commercial ventures. If the Lewis family is emphasized, please explain the specific significant achievements or activities of one or more members of the Lewis family and relate this significance to the nominated property.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

SUMMARY

The Lewis Brothers Building has been a hallmark of the Fayetteville Square since its completion in 1908. Its distinctive red-brick-and-white-limestone presence dominates the northwest corner of the Square, and it survives as the only Queen Anne-Classical Revival style commercial building in the area. The Lewis Brothers Building is also significant as the location of the Lewis Brothers Hardware Store, which operated until 1986 and was the oldest retail concern in the city.

ELABORATION

The Lewis Brothers partnership began in 1897, when the family opened a hardware stone with W. T. Farrar. With a move to the present building in 1908, the Lewis Brothers began a history of influence in the Fayetteville community which continues to the present day (although the original five brothers are now deceased). The hardware store, which soon expanded to include housewares and furniture, provided an unofficial community hub during the early 1900's, a "Saturday night gathering place," and the building came to symbolize a tradition of service and fairness. Essentially a college town, Fayetteville began to grow steadily after the turn of the century, and its downtown square became the shopping center not only for that city, but for much of Northwest Arkansas.

Lewis Brothers Hardware developed a reputation for stocking a wide variety of merchandise, and often items that were hard to obtain in that remote area of the state could be purchased there. Their motto was "We Have It Now," and variety was enhanced by quality, Lewis Brothers being the only store in the area to carry such items as buffets from the Abernathy Company in Kansas City or the fine livery of the Askew Saddle Company. In the 1920's they were the first to sell the new General Electric refrigerator and were the sole purveyor of such luxuries as Haviland China.

With the advent of the automobile, shopping habits began to change and many businesses relocated closer to major highways, but Lewis Brothers remained at the same location. Members of the Lewis family used the hardware business as a springboard for other commercial ventures, from cattle farming to automobile dealerships. Most notably, two of the Lewis Brothers, Art and Bert, began a long history of family involvement in local financial circles as original stockholders in Fayetteville's First National Bank. With the commercial endeavors of the family rapidly expanding, the Lewis family sold the hardware business in 1957, but retained ownership of the building and leased it to the new proprietors. The Lewis Brothers name remained, however, and the store continued operation until 1986, making it the longest-running retail concern in the city of Fayetteville which was continuously operated at the same location. With the recent revitalization of the downtown square, very few historic buildings remain. Mrs. Young's Store and the Guisinger building (NR 9/20/84) are the most notable, and neither of them can boast of being home to the same business for close to eighty years.

The Fayetteville Square is a dynamic combination of old and new structures, and the presence of the Lewis Brothers Building provides an anchor for the old as well as a reference for the new. The red-brick-and-white-limestone theme is echoed in the Old Post Office Building,
