DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Hotel Wilber fronts on Wilson (formerly Doane) Street just one-half block north of Wilber's main business street. The structure is a two-story brick over a limestone basement and is ell-shaped in plan. The front measures 33 by 48 feet while the ell measures 33 by 53 feet. No architect has been identified for the building however it was constructed by Isaac Hickman of Beatrice (stone and brick work) and Charles Whipple, G. D. Coe and George Smith (carpentry work) of Wilber. Although deteriorated, the building remains in virtually original condition according to the detailed newspaper account which documented the opening of the hotel.¹

The building was designed to accommodate the needs of a first class hotel. The front portion of the building contains a large office and lobby as well as a front and back parlor and family rooms. Writing, toilet and baggage rooms occupy the space between the front office and the large dining room which was able to seat fifty people. The well-equipped kitchen occupies the rear of the ell. An Eastlake-inspired, red oak stairway leads to the sleeping rooms upstairs from the main lobby.

A small lobby is provided at the top of the stairs where the east-west and north-south hallways intersect. The second floor is divided into twenty separate rooms (many of which have not been touched since the hotel closed ca. 1960's) with appropriate closets and a bathroom.

The basement, which is reached by way of the rear stairway, is confined to the rear ell portion of the building. Two compartments are provided: one for the laundry facilities and one for the building's heating plant.

Little has changed since its construction. Some modernization of the kitchen and bathroom facilities have been done as well as the updating of electric lights. The pressed metal ceilings which enhance nearly every room may have been added around the turn of the century. The north and west walls of the building were stuccoed at some time in the recent past.

The building has been acquired by the Nebraska Czechs of Wilber who plan an adaptive use of the structure. Clean-up operations have begun and the used car lot along the north edge of the property has been removed.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

In March 1895, the town of Wilber, Nebraska was left without a hotel, due to a disastrous fire in the downtown area. The city had discussed their need for a commodious brick hotel as early as 1890, but it wasn't until the spring of 1895 that a stock company was formed to erect a new hotel. Work began in April and in August 1895 the Hotel Wilber opened. For this small community (ca. 1,000 population), this hotel was an elaborate addition to the commercial development of the town. It was a social center for the local citizens and a haven for travelers arriving to do business in this rural county seat.

Due to the efforts of the Nebraska Czechs of Wilber, the hotel will remain a social center for Wilber residents and the many thousands of people who visit this community annually because of its designation as the Czech Capital of Nebraska.

The Hotel Wilber stands today as a significant example of late nineteenth century commercial architecture and a building type which, while once ubiquitous, is fast disappearing from the village scene. The building represents a restrained elegance which is noteworthy for the era within which it was built. Built of standard masonry construction, most of the building displays the stilted segmental arch so common for the period. Window and door openings on the front, however, display rough cut stone lintels and sills. Overall emphasis is placed on the front facade which features a two-story columned portico and the unusually well preserved false, pressed-metal gable. A simple pressed metal, bracketed cornice (which is executed in corbelled brick on the rest of the building) completes the decorative motif. The image of luxury portrayed by this facade, so appropriate to its function, does much to enhance the Hotel's significance within the corpus of its building type.
