7 DESCRIPTION

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DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The one and one-half-story Rock Creek cabin is constructed of logs that were squared by broad axe. The logs are dovetail notched (compound angle) and daubed with cement that is chinked with quarter-split poles on the cabin's north interior. The gables have clapboard siding. The cabin measures $27 \times 26'$, with an attached front porch extending 8' beyond the building's southwest wall. A cement foundation supports the cabin.

A brick chimney vents the original cast iron Majestic, a woodburning stove still used for cooking and heating. A propane stove and refrigerator have been added to the original furnishings. A permanent ladder extends to the sleeping and storage loft, which was built with roughcut lumber.


After its construction in 1915, the cabin's upkeep has been maintained by Forest Service employees.

The cabin received a new porch and 2" pine, tongue and groove floor in 1939; a new roof in 1943; and a rear kitchen lean-to in the forties that was removed in 1974. In 1975, YCC crews replaced the cedar shake roof and installed a new tongue and groove floor of 4" pine. They applied new cement daubing to the exterior log joints in 1976.

A corral and loading chute are 54' west of the cabin, which is surrounded by a 55 \times 90' lodgepole rail fence. Eighty-two feet northeast of the cabin is a springhouse built directly over Tindall Creek.

The 13 x 11.75' structure was built of axe-cut logs that are both v-notched and saddle-notched. The cement daubing is deteriorating and many of the log joints are exposed. The building has a flagstone floor and a green shingle roof. Food is suspended from the ceiling for storage.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Rock Creek Cabin's architectural design and craftsmanship are its most significant features. The cabin and adjoining spring house are excellent examples of early Forest Service stations and exhibit expert craftsmanship in log construction. They were probably built by A. Hutsinfiller (Hutsinpilar?), who began squatting on the public land in 1894. He sold the ranch buildings (1 two-roomed house, 4 out buildings, 2 barns) to D. L. Walker of Phillipsburg in October 1902. The place was known as the Walker Goat Ranch when Forest Service officials began eviction proceedings in 1907. Walker was paid \$200 for the seized ranch improvements, and the cabin was converted to an administrative site, the Rock Creek Ranger Station, by 1915. Mules and maintenance crews were stationed at the work center. Recently volunteers to the National Forest serving as campground hosts have lived in the cabin each summer. The building also still serves as a work center for occasional crews.
