### 7. Description

Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

Prominently situated on a corner lot in one of Des Moines" oldest residential suburbs, the Samuel A. and Margaret Stevenson House is one of the city's best preserved, extant examples of a residence that combines elements of the Stick and Eastlake styles. Once a fairly common style in Des Moines and very popular with the developers of the city's late 19th century suburbs, the vast majority of this type have either been demolished, altered beyond recognition, or lost their character due to the addition of false siding. The Stevenson house also retains an unusually large amount of its original interior fabric as well.


The Stevenson house rests on brick foundations over a partially-raised full basement. Of wood frame construction, its exterior walls are sheathed with painted clapboards, featuring vertical and horizontal trim boards, and it is capped with a crossgabled roof of medium pitch, presently covered with asbestos shingles but originally featuring wood shingles. The roof is pierced along its ridge line by plain, single, interior chimney stacks, which most likely originally featured corbelled caps. Windows are generally of the one-over-one wood sash variety and are set in rectangular wooden surrounds. Although the windows appear to be identical, a degree of variety is achieved by varying their width and height, and on the west side they are even placed asymetrically in the wall. The three entrances, all with what appear to be original doors, are flanked by rather elaborate porches on the north, east, and west sides.

Stylistically, the Stevenson house shows the influence of the Stick and Eastlake styles. The Stick influence is most noticeable in the horizontal and vertical boards which were applied to the walls on the north, east, and west sides of the house. The influence of this style can also be seen in the large projecting gables that cap the chamfered bays on the north and east sides. As viewed from those sides, the Stevenson house is somewhat reminiscent of a Swiss chalet, a building type most architectural historians view as being a major contributing factor to the Stick style. The Stick influence can also be felt in the general asymetrical arrangement of the house and its variety of roof forms. The Eastlake influence is clearly discernible in the house's three porches, all of which are largely intact. All three feature the large turned posts, brackets that appear to have a three dimensional quality, incised frieze work, and incised lattice work that characterize the Eastlake style.

Inside, the house consists of four rooms and a large entrance hall on the first floor, five bedrooms on the second floor, and a large floored attic. There appears to have been little change in room arrangement over the years except for the conversion of a butler's pantry adjacent to the kitchen into a half bath. Most of the original interior fabric appears to be intact, including hardwood floors, wood trim, doors and hardware, a door with colored, etched glass, two stained glass windows, an elaborately carved Eastlake staircase, and a rather elaborate mantel with colored tiles.

Currently, the house is undergoing restoration by its new owner, who is Executive Director of the lowa Chapter, Victorian Society of America. In addition to correcting a number of problems created by deferred maintenance and painting and papering the interior, the owner is giving high priority to restoring and rebuilding the porches on the north and east sides which have deteriorated severely in recent years. The house currently served as her private residence and office space for the lowa Chapter, Victorian Society of America.

#### HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE

The Samuel A. and Margaret Stevenson House is one of Des Moines' best preserved examples of a residence that combines elements of the Stick and Eastlake styles. Once a fairly common house type in Des Moines and especially popular with developers of the city's late 19th century suburbs, the vast majority of this type have either been demolished, altered practically beyond recognition, or lost most of their original character due to the addition of false siding. The Stevenson house also retains an unusually large amount of its original interior fabric as well.

The abstract of title indicates that Samuel A. and Margaret Stevenson purchased the site for this house from the Vermont Syndicate, developers of Kingman Place, in 1889. The fact they immediately mortgaged the property for \$2,687.50 to the syndicate most likely indicates that the Stevensons engaged that group to erect their house for them, probably choosing a design from a pattern book or stock plan. Newspaper advertisements for Kingman Place and other subdivisions in the late 1880's and 1890's often had woodcuts that featured a variety of houses with Stick and Eastlake style characteristics, and probably indicates that Des Moines developers in this era played a majro role in housing design, either through the use of a particular pattern book or hiring an architect to develop several stock plans.

Stevenson, who was the ticket agent for one of the railroad lines serving Des Moines, and his family retained ownership of the house until 1894. In 1903 Florence B. and William B. Harrison purchased the house, and they and their family owned and occupied the house until 1928. In that latter year Mrs. Albert Gardner purchased it, and it remained in her family until 1970. Since the latter date it has had several owners.
