This house is significant for its ar	

This house is significant for its architecture and its association with the exploration and settlement of the Bergen County, New Jersey area. It is a reasonably well preserved example of the Form/Plan Type as shown and more fully described herein. As such, it is included in the Thematic Nomination to the National Register of Historic Places for the Early Stone Houses of Bergen County, New Jersey.

The sheepskin deed now [?] in the posession of Mrs. Duke [the owner at the time of the HABS], who is a Haring descendant, indicates that Abram Haring came into the posession of the property upon which this house was erected through the payment of five shillings current money of New York. The variation in spelling is due to the fact that some of the descendants of the old Haring family changed the spelling to Herring. Te first of the Haring family came to America in 1660.

The old Herring house built in 1758 is still [22] standing to the north of this structure.
