#### Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

This is a well preserved example of a late Italianate brick residence. It exhibits a restraint in design somewhat unusual during this exuberant period. The careful craftsmanship and attention to details make this otherwise simple structure outstanding This is the only example in Jefferson County of a cast iron porch, and the hoodmolds are of a different design than those found on other Fairfield residences. This was built as a quality residence and has been maintained in the same manner.

This is a two and a half story late Italianate brick residence (1888) with cast iron wrap around porch across the west and south sides. The cast stone hood molds feature an incised Eastlake design. Large scroll brackets appear to be of wood and are placed on a frieze of narrow vertical boards. The house appears basically unaltered except for the raised roof and dormers, and the bay on the south. The structure (with carriage house) sits on a landscaped lot slightly larger than one-half city block. The residential character of the immediate neighborhood remains, although houses from later periods now dominate. The size of the Montgomery lot protects it from visual intrusions.

#### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

This well preserved brick Italianate house, in addition to its architectural significance, calls to thematic attention the importance of industry in the development of Fairfield, Iowa.

Joel Turney & Co. was Jefferson County's largest private sector employer prior to World War One. The firm was one of the early factories of large scale in the community. The firm manufactured farm wagons. "Rugged construction and 'quality workmanship made "Charter Oak' and 'Fairfield' wagons highly desirable to midwestern farmers." (Welty, <u>A Fair Field</u>, p. 285). The company began operations in Fairfield in 1888. It was privately owned by four partners: Joel Turney, the founder; Dillon Turney and Ells-worth E. Turney, his sons; and James H. Montgomery.

Three extant buildings in Fairfield bear witness to the importance of this industry in the community:

Factory Buildings501 North Eighth St.Dillon Turney House405 East BurlingtonJames H. Montgomery House605 North Third St.

Two other buildings associated with the company are non-extant:

Joel Turney House Corner North 4th & Kirkwood Ellsworth E. Turney House 300 West Burlington

James H. Montgomery (1860-1948) was Superintendent of the company and the only partner unrelated to the other three. He bought the Burnett-Montgomery House in 1906. Burnett, a local lumber merchant built the house in 1888. Montgomery lived here until his death in 1948. With Dillon Turney, Montgomery contined the successful production of wagons after the death of Joel and retirement of Ellsworth Turney. Montgomery ceased operations at the factory after Dillon's death in 1932. The Great Depression and decline in popularity of horse-drawn wagons were also factors.

Industry remains an important theme in the economic development of Fairfield. Over the years, Fairfield has attracted much industry and Joel Turney & Co. was the first to come through active solicitation. The company contributed much to civic pride in manufacturing.
