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Bedens Brook Road Bridge, Somerset County, New Jersey

DESCRIPTION

The Bedens Brook Road Bridge is a single-arched, random rubble structure, approximately 20 feet long and 20 feet wide, which crosses a narrow branch of Bedens Brook just east of Province Line Road in Montgomery Township. Its stonework, arch, parapets, and wing walls are intact and little altered, and the structure retains its integrity of design, materials, and workmanship. It also retains its integrity of location, setting, feeling, and association. It has not been moved and continues in use - a single vehicle crossing it at a time - and its setting is still wooded and largely rural.

A heavy, cube-like structure, the main body of the bridge is about 20 feet long, 20 feet from outside wall to outside wall, and 11 feet high from the top of its 30-inch-tall parapet walls to the bed of the shallow brook. The large rectangular capstones that top its parapet walls are about 20 inches wide. The inside distance between the parapet walls, across the asphalt roadway, is about 16 1/2 feet. The bridge's single, slightly skewed arch is about 13 feet wide and six feet high. Its voussoirs are rectangular and about 16 inches tall. At the north-facing arch is a raised, rusticated keystone.

Four wing walls abut the arched section of the bridge. Like that section, they are primarily formed of long, rectangular, irregular, randomly laid blocks of local quartzite and argillite, as well as some brownstone. The northwest wing wall is about 17 feet long, the southwest wing wall about 18 feet long. At the other approach to the bridge, the southeast wing wall is about 17 1/2 feet long, the northeast wall about 7 1/2 feet long. Capstones top the wing walls. Modern metal guardrails lead up to them. Aside from some modern remortaring, the bridge is intact and little altered.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Bedens Brook Road Bridge is significant for its engineering under National Register Criterion C, for it embodies a type, period, and method of construction. It is one of the few stone bridges surviving in Somerset County from the 18th and 19th centuries. Its permanent nature and relatively late construction date testify to the continued central role of roadways in the county's transportation network late in the century. Its arched form represents the form and method of construction of late 19th-century stone arch bridges in the county. It further suggests the continued use of the stone arch in the county at small water crossings well into the 19th century; many larger water crossings were spanned in the county, by the late 19th century, by metal truss bridges. Even though built late in the century, the bridge is significant as one of the few surviving 19th-century stone structures of any type in the county.

The bridge was likely constructed in the late 19th century, sometime after Bedens Road was laid out in 1872 (Somerset County Road Returns, Book C, p. 242). Its appearance is different than that of the other surviving stone arch road bridges in the county, three of which the 1798 Kingston Bridge, the 1822 Opossum Road Bridge, and the 1825 Cat Tail Brook Bridge can be dated to the late 18th or early 19th century. It is constructed of shallower rectangular blocks of stone, more regularly laid, than these earlier dated structures. Two mills stood on Bedens Brook near the site of the bridge in 1850, and farms are shown stretched to the north of the brook, near the present site of the road, on both the 1850 and 1873 maps (Otley and Keily 1850; Beers 1873); it is therefore possible that the bridge (or its abutments) was privately built at an earlier date. The expense of such an endeavor, and the appearance of the structure, make that highly unlikely, however.

The bridge is remarkably intact - retaining its stonework, arch, wing walls, and even parapet walls - for a structure that has been in continuous use. In all likelihood it was built by a local mason who may also have been its engineer. It is built of local stone, its adornment provided by its neatly laid voussoirs and a single rough keystone. It is a good example not only of local bridge building methods, but of stone construction in general in the county. It is one of the most imposing and intact of the few 18th- and 19th-century stone structures of any type that survive in the county.

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
Bedens Brook Road Bridge, Somerset County, New Jersey

VERBAL BOUNDARY DESCRIPTION

The nominated resource occupies the property upon which the main body of the bridge and its wing walls and abutments stand.

BOUNDARY JUSTIFICATION
