DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Located on a 163-acre tract partially within the city limits of Natchez, Mississippi, is Elms Court, a five-bay, two-story frame residence covered by a pyramidal roof. As it was originally built in ca. 1836, Elms Court was similar in both design and plan to other large Natchez residences of the period. The facade was covered with flush siding and a giant order portico occupied the center bay. Flanked by six-over-six double-hung windows with black painted sash, the entrance frontispiece consisted of a large, eightpaneled door, sidelights and transom, and was framed by Ionic columns supporting a wide returned entablature. A broad center passage, which connected the north portico and the south (rear) gallery, separated double parlors on the east from dining room, stair alcove and library opposite. Much of the interior trim, such as the symmetrical architraves with corner blocks and simple wooden columnar mantels, today remains intact. A splendid recessed centerpiece with papyrus and acanthus ornamentation located in the center passage, and several more common pinwheel centerpieces located elsewhere on the first floor may also date to the original construction of the house.

When it became the residence of Ayers P. Merrill in 1852, Elms Court was enlarged and remodelled to the appearance known today. The north elevation was transformed from its early Greek Revival design to that of a more Romantic villa by the removal of the single-bay portico and installation of the existing double-tier cast-iron gallery along the entire facade. Added at the same time were symmetrical one-story wings with iron galleries. The entire north elevation, which is now painted white, was then blocked off and pencilled to simulate ashlar masonry, and painted varying hues of brownstone. The interior of the flanking wings, trimmed in typical Greek Revival fashion with battered-and-eared architraves and arched, or "New Grecian," marble mantels, contained a billiard room, an office, bedrooms and a kitchen. Curvilinear Gothic mantels replaced early wooden ones in two rooms in the older section. Most significantly, a new dining room was created when the small library behind the stair alcove was joined to the newly enclosed rear gallery, the seam being disguised by a wide arch supported by reeded pilasters, and the end chimney being moved to an interior wall to provide a symmetrical A large punka, or fan, suspended from wrought iron brackets straddling axis. the arch, was installed during the remodelling. The enclosed rear gallery also provided space for a small sitting room and vestibule on the first floor and a bath and sun room on the second. With the completion of the ca. 1852 remodelling, Elms Court assumed what is substantially its present-day appearance.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Constructed in ca. 1836, Elms Court is a significant and well-preserved example of the Greek Revival style and is one of the most prominent "suburban villas" in the Natchez region. Its notable galleries, which were added across the entire facade in ca. 1852, are possibly the most lavish use of ornamental iron in Mississippi. In addition to its architectural interest, Elms Court is significant as the residence of Ayers P. Merrill, a locally important merchant, planter and diplomat.

In 1835, the widow of Governor Winthrop Sargent conveyed 228 acres of her plantation, "Gloucester," to Jefferson Beaumont, a wealthy Natchez businessman (Deed Book W:502). The following year Beaumont divided the property and sold a twenty-nine acre tract to Eliza and Katherine Evans, who constructed the original two-story, five-bay center section of Elms Court (Deed Book II: 282). The Evans sisters retained the title to Elms Court until 1842 when it was sold to George W. Turner, who more than doubled its acreage over the following decade (Deed Book DD:451). In 1852, the property was purchased for \$25,000 by Francis Surget, Sr. (Deed Book II:306), ". . . an early pioneer and the richest and most successful planter of this [the Natchez] section" (Goodspeed, 2:431), who presented it to his daughter, Mrs. Ayers P. (Jane Surget) Merrill, as a wedding gift. The Merrills soon enlarged the house, redecorated portions of the interior, and installed the splendid iron galleries along the north elevation. Except for the addition of bathrooms in secondary spaces and certain other necessary modernizations, Elms Court stands today substantially as it did during the Merrill ownership.

Ayers P. Merrill was a native of Adams County, Mississippi, a graduate of Harvard and a student of law in the New Orleans office of Seargent S. Prentiss, the famous political orator. After his marriage to Jane Surget in 1851, he settled at Elms Court and became a successful planter. At the close of the Civil War, Merrill, whose wife had died in 1864, moved to New York and began the commission merchant partnership of Goodman and Merrill. In 1876, President U. S. Grant appointed Merrill United States Minister to the Kingdom of Belgium, a position he held for a few years until paralysis forced him to retire to Elms Court, where he died in 1882 (National Cyclopedia of American Biography, 12:314; Goodspeed, 2:430-32).

In 1895, James Surget bought Elms Court from Merrill's heirs and gave the property to his newly married daughter. Mrs. David L. McKittrick (Deed Book 3L:746). The house is now occupied by her daughter, Mrs. Grace M. S. MacNeil, who regularly opens it to the public.

VERBAL BOUNDARY DESCRIPTION

Except for twelve acres recently added, the tract of land known as Elms Court reached its present size during the Merrill ownership (1852-1895). Because of the encroaching commercial and residential development of the city of Natchez, it is important that the total Elms Court tract be preserved as the setting appropriate for this significant "suburban villa." The tract consists of the land south and west of John R. Junkin Drive between the center lines of the Pearl Bayou and the Spanish Bayou.
