Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

Located northeast of Centreville, on the eastern side of State Highway 33 about one and a fourth miles north of the intersection of State Highway 48, Sunnyslope is located about four hundred feet from the road and is entered by a gravel drive. The vernacular, frame, Greek Revival plantation residence is set upon brick foundation piers and is topped with a gabled roof pierced by one interior brick chimney. The six-bay, westerly facade is fronted by a recessed gallery with molded cornice that is supported by wooden box columns with molded capitals. The columns are linked by an unusual railing consisting of a molded handrail and a wide, molded and paneled foot rail with no balusters. The facade of the house is plastered and adorned with a dado composed of molded chair rail, horizontal matched boards, and wide unmolded baseboard. All windows contain six-over-six, double-hung sash and were originally closed by shutter blinds, some now missing. Access to the interior is provided through two entry doorways located in the center bay of each three-bay half of the facade. Each entry doorway consists of an unmolded, four-panel door set beneath a transom.

The unusual interior floor plan is a variation on the early regional single-pile plan which features rear "cabinet" rooms enclosing each end of a recessed rear gallery. In Sunnyslope, which has no central hallway, this plan is varied by the original enclosure of the rear gallery area for a stair hall and by the original division of the northern rear "cabinet" room into two smaller rooms. The interior of the house is identically trimmed throughout with wooden pilastered mantel pieces, unmolded four-panel doors, unmolded door and window surrounds, and wide unmolded baseboards. The stairway, which features neither newels nor balusters, begins in a short open flight on the eastern hall wall, makes an open quarter turn with winders, and continues in a straight enclosed flight in a westerly direction to terminate in an unusual L-shaped hallway which provides access to the two upstairs bedrooms. The upstairs bedrooms and the front northern downstairs room feature large closets located adjacent to the central chimney. Each closet contains original wooden pegs and is closed by double-leaf doors that match the other doors of the house. Most of the doors of the house still retain their original oak-graining.

The rear of the house has been altered by the deterioration of the original three-bay back porch. A gabled-roof frame dependency with central chimney once stood to the rear of the main house and was linked to the house by a covered walk. No original outbuildings survive, but a large metal-clad barn, constructed in the twentieth century, is located northeast of the house.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

Sunnyslope is representative of the typical Mississippi, mid-nineteenth century, Greek Revival plantation residence which is characteristically described as a one-and-a-half story frame dwelling with gabled roof and recessed front gallery. However, certain vernacular architectural features render Sunnyslope unique among its Mississippi counterparts. The house retains the facade configuration of earlier houses in the Federal Style which feature two entrance doorways rather than the more typical mid-nineteenth century, center-bay entrance doorway that opens onto a central hallway. Its gallery railing, which features a molded handrail and wide, paneled footrail, may be the only such gallery railing extant in the state. The interior floor plan of both the principal and second stories may also be unique for Mississippi. The interior floor plan, which is a common variation on the early regional single-pile plan which features rear "cabinet" rooms enclosing each end of a recessed rear gallery, differs from its counterparts in that the northern rear "cabinet" room was originally divided into two smaller rooms. The L-shaped hallway of the second-story and the configuration of the stairway which opens onto the hallway also have no precedent in Mississippi regional architecture. Perhaps the most functional of the oddities of Sunnyslope are the large closets of three of the major rooms. These closets, which feature original wooden pegs, are closed by full-sized, double-leaf doors that retain their original oak graining. Since Sunnyslope stylistically dates to the mid-1850's, the house was probably constructed as the plantation residence of Joseph W. Anderson and his wife Margaret on land given to Anderson by his family. No record of Joseph Anderson's marriage has been located, but it probably occurred in the early 1850's, since Margaret Anderson joined Bethany Presbyterian Church in 1853 and the birth of their oldest child was recorded in the same year (Records of Bethany Presbyterian Church, Centreville Public Library, Centreville, Mississippi). The Andersons were among the earliest and most prominent settlers of Amite County with John Anderson having come to Amite County from South Carolina in 1821 (Biographical and Historical Memoirs of Mississippi [Chicago: The Goodspeed Publishing Company, 1891], Vol. I, 304). Sunnyslope has been owned by the same family since its construction and is now the property of Joseph Anderson's great-grandson, Dr. William Polk, who plans to sympathetically restore the property. Although in poor to fair condition, the integrity of the house is outstanding.
