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Woodman Road District

Northeast of the Town Center District are two sites located along Woodman Road which form an architecturally unified district historically associated with South Hampton's nineteenth century agricultural development. The Woodman Road District includes two wooden, $2^{1}{2}$ story, Greek Revival style houses which are sited on opposing sides of Woodman Road. Both structures were constructed in the mid-nineteenth century as part of agricultural complexes and retain a sufficient amount of open acreage to maintain their original character.

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WOODMAN ROAD DISTRICT

The Woodman Road District centers on two vernacular Greek Revival farmhouses (Sites 55 + 56), constructed by the locally prominent Woodman family and remaining significant portions of their original acreage. The two houses closely resemble each other in their simplified detailing, gable-front orientation, and side hall plans. The earlier of the houses (Site 56) is significant for its association with the Free Will Baptists (who met here from 1830 to 1849), one of a multiplicity of religious sects which flourished in South Hampton in this period. The two houses, which maintain architectural and site integrity, are important for their association with the history of South Hampton in the first half of the nineteenth century.

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NAME: The Woodman Road District

VERBAL BOUNDARY DESCRIPTION: The boundary of the Woodman Road District originates at a point co-terminus with the northeast corner of Site 55 (3-3) and the mid-line of Woodman Road. The boundary line then proceeds south along the mid-line of Woodman Road to a point perpendicular to the northern property line of Site 56 (3-10A). It then circles this property along the north, east and south borders to the mid-line of Woodman Road and follows the center line north to a point perpendicular with the corner of Site 55 (3-3). The district boundary then traces the property line of Site 55 (3-3) southwest, due west, northeast, and due east to the point of origin at the mid-line of Woodman Road.

BOUNDARY JUSTIFICATION: The boundaries of the Woodman Road District encompass the two Greek Revival farm complexes and the surviving acreage historically owned by the Woodman family.

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

ADDITIONAL ARCHITECTURAL AND STRUCTURAL DESCRIPTION:

Built c. 1850, this is basically a Greek Revival structure which through later alterations has obtained a trace of Italianate detail. Greek Revival elements of this house include: the gable end facing the street; a recessed sidehall entry; a four-panel door with sidelights extending its full height; and pilasters supporting a partial entablature.

The Italianate influence is demonstrated by the use of brackets under the projecting raking eaves and partial entablature.

Other features include; a boxed cornice on the raking eaves, six-over-six windows with projecting caps; shutters on the south side windows; an enclosed porch to the south, and two ells with gable roofs.

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BOUNDARY AND ACREAGE DESCRIPTION:

Four acres bounded on the north-Flett, east-Wallem, and Woodman Road, south-Wallem and west-Wallem.

REFERENCES:

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE (Evaluation & Historical Associations):

The Cornwell house is a blend of Greek Revival and Italianate elements of style. This house combines with the Boswell House to the east to form a visual anchor along this section of Woodman Road.

Surrounded by open land, it stands as a visual reminder of South Hampton's agricultural heritage.

The 1892 map indicates that the owner of the home was Mrs. A. Woodman.



ADDITIONAL ARCHITECTURAL AND STRUCTURAL DESCRIPTION:

Broad and heavy in appearance, with its gable end facing the street, the Verge. house was built in the Greek Revival style. Its architectural integrity has been affected though, by various alterations and additions to the original structure in particular, the application of asphalt sheeting over the original clapboards. Features of this house include: a sidehall entrance with a four-panel door; sidelights set back within a screened porch; two over two windows with plain surrounds; a boxed cornice with a decorated frieze; and a triangular pediment in the gable end.

RELATED STRUCTURES AND CONTEXT:

Newly redone board & batten barn with old fieldstone foundation. Large sliding doors on barn. 2 car garage attached to barn.

BOUNDARY AND ACREAGE DESCRIPTION: 3 Acres. Bounded to the N. by Merrill, E. by Boswell, S. by Boswell and N. by Woodman Road.

REFERENCES:

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE (Evaluation & Historical Associations):

This house was once a working farm and maintains that character. It sits on 25 acres of open and once agricultural land. Greek Revival features remaining include: the pedimented gable end oriented toward the street; the sidehall entry; and the four-panel Greek Revival doors. This house was used as a meeting place by the Free Will Baptists between 1830 and 1849, during which time it was the home of Mrs. Dorothy Woodman. The Free Will Baptists disbanded in 1849.
